WORDS FROM THE CHAIR

The businesses of Overlook are as much a part of the fabric of the neighborhood as the families who live here. Sometimes our goals are not the same. OKNA makes a significant effort to bridge the gap between business and the neighborhood. For example, businesses are invited to present at our meetings. We have recently heard presentations from Sal's Famous Italian Kitchen, Freightliner, Overlook Village, and Kaiser. Our participation in the Interstate Corridor Urban Renewal Advisory Committee, with the PDC, on the Killingsworth Station selection committee, and in liquor license approvals are other recent examples of our efforts to work with the business community. In addition, your OKNA supports business through our Overlook Business Directory and with advertising in our New Neighbor packs.

When there is contention, the association works with businesses to establish a common understanding of the role business plays in the community through "Good Neighbor Agreements." Several GNAs are in place with local business to address litter, crime, an unsightly lot, or other issues. In rare situations the association opposes a business. In May the general membership voted unanimously to oppose an adult video store to be located across the street from Ockley Green Middle School. While pornography and adult businesses have always existed in Overlook, the location of this one, literally 45 feet from the school yard, makes all the difference. We offered the proprietor the opportunity to present the case that his business will not endanger our children. If you saw the late night news on May 24, you know the proprietor's representative responded by saying the "small minded people" of Ockley Green should not waste their time opposing this business and risk litigation if they do.

We think it is unfortunate that the proprietor and his representative felt the necessity of being this confrontational. Children's welfare is involved in this situation so we are ready to raise the decibel level of our diplomatic voice. The Ockley Green Citizens Committee has been formed to handle this effort and reach beyond Overlook. Over 150 people have joined. Still, OGCC could use more help. KP EXPANDS IN OVERLOOK

Kaiser Permanente is constructing a Radiation Therapy /Treatment Facility on the Interstate Campus. This 17,000-square-foot building is being designed around the specific needs of patients with cancer who are undergoing radiation therapy. Starting with "square one" fundamentals like making the building more accessible, we are envisioning ways to provide a supportive, comforting and soothing atmosphere. outdoor landscaping. The landscaping surrounding the new building has been specially designed to soften the building exterior and to add the color and greenery that is so representative of our great Northwest environment.

As an organization dedicated to being a good neighbor, Kaiser Permanente recognizes the two major concerns surrounding this new facility. Does the new building fit in visually with the neighborhood? How do the construction phase and the added patients affect the Overlook neighborhood?

To serve the parking needs of the new patients, a new parking garage will be constructed on what is currently a surface parking lot next to the Kaiser Permanente East Interstate building. Construction on the parking garage will begin in July, and it should be finished in about five months. But for those five months, patients must have access to the most convenient parking spaces. This means that some spaces now used by employees will be re-designated for patients. Here's how we propose to accommodate the employees until the new parking structure is complete. In cooperation with Tri-Met and the Rose Quarter, Kaiser Permanente is exploring arrangements to exchange employee parking spaces. During the day, Kaiser Permanente employees might have the opportunity to park at the Rose Quarter and take MAX to the Interstate Campus. In exchange Rose Quarter employees might use the Kaiser parking facilities evenings and week-ends. To facilitate this, Tri-Met would discount monthly MAX passes for participating Kaiser Permanente employees. The proposed relocation of approximately 100 employee vehicles from the Kaiser Permanente Interstate Campus would help make up for the parking spaces impacted during construction. If it becomes necessary, we have a back-up plan in place: hiring a service to valet park staff cars on the campus. The project schedule will be:

- July-Dec 2004-Parking Garage construction
- Oct, 2004-Nov 2005-Radiation Therapy/ Treatment Center construction.

Brad Halverson, from the Overlook Neighborhood Association, participated on the Parking Solution Committee and is expected to monitor the construction phases. Overlook Views will keep you updated.


EDITORIAL—BUY LOCAL

- July 17 (Saturday) 9:00 AM "Overlook Views" Starts at the southeast corner of Overlook Park and proceeds through the Overlook neighborhood, including adidas Village and Madrona Park. 3.5 miles/90 minutes

We provide full day/full week preschool classes, half week /part day pre-school classes, home based services, and a prenatal program. In all of our programs, Family Advocates team with teachers to help connect families to community resources and coordinate family needs such as healthcare, education, and housing. A MESSAGE FROM PAIGE FOX PRINCIPAL, BEACH SCHOOL

As I reflect on my move to Portland and my acceptance of the position as principal at Beach Elementary, I am pleased to say that the decision for me was a positive one.

This year has been busy at Beach with big changes in the areas of technology, reading and dual language.

With regard to technology, we received a grant which allowed us to have a brand new state of the art computer lab. This lead to intensive teacher training---which in turn resulted in enhanced student learning. Our kids have created PowerPoint presentations, web searches and are involved in keyboarding and writing activities.

In addition to technology, reading has been a focus for our teachers because we also received a Reading First Grant. This grant has allowed us to purchase all new reading materials as well as hire a full time Literacy Coach whose goal is to increase the capacity of teachers as they address the literacy needs of their students. Moreover, our staff has benefited from a great deal of in-depth development in the area of literacy which really helps us get better at our craft.

Finally, our Dual Language program has really forged ahead this year. As a reminder, Dual Language is a type of bilingual education in which 50% of students are native English speakers and 50% are native Speakers of Spanish. The goal of the program is that all students will be both bilingual and biliterate by grade 5. This program has both grown and changed. We will be having a section of Dual Immersion taught in Pre Kindergarten next year. Also, more curriculum will be taught in Spanish, at the lower grades, and there

will be more use of theme based instruction at all grade levels.

Although Beach has experienced a lot of transformation over the past year, I am pleased to report that working together with staff and parents has enabled us to make progress. We are building a strong community meaningful for our students and families. It is our hope that we can continue to build a positive relationship with our neighbors and continue to contribute to our neighborhood in a positive way for years to come. Please do come and visit us; see the great things that are happening for kids in our school. We have many opportunities to volunteer here. Are you good at writing grants and want to help us fund a new outdoor play structure for our? How about joining our SMART program and reading with our kids? Our PTA meets every second Tuesday of the month at 7:15 P.M.; it would be great to have your thoughts and ideas. Is painting your strength? We are hoping to spruce up our school this summer and could always use a little help. As you can see there are many opportunities to help out here at Beach. We also want you to know that we would welcome community service opportunities for students in the fall.

In sum, this year has been for me a great adventure at Beach filled with exciting changes that will have wonderful effects on student learning in the years to come. I look forward to the future at Beach and in the Overlook Neighborhood Association. Have a great summer with your children.
