### **Organic Brewers Festival** Overlook Park June 26-28

The North American Organic Brewers Festival returns to Overlook Park June 26-28th, featuring the world's largest variety of organic beers.



The NAOBF, presented by Roots Organic Brewing, is in its 5th incarnation, and promotes sustainable living as well as organic beer

The NAOBF benefits the Leukemia

Lymphoma Society, the Oregon Tilth, which promotes organic agriculture, Willamette Riverkeeper, a local non-profit organization whose sole mission is to protect and restore the Willamette River and the Oregon Food Bank, which feeds the hungry. A diverse program of music runs throughout the event, and a children's area provides activities for youngsters. Local food vendors offer a variety of cuisine from naturally raised local pork sausages, to organic African cuisine, to veggie dogs.

NAOBF organizers strive to make it the most earth friendly beer festival in North America. Festival attendees sample beer from compostable corn-starch tasting glasses instead of the heavy plastic mugs used at other beer festivals. Composting and recycling stations are provided for festival waste and food vendors are required to use compostable cutlery and plates.

The NAOBF will be open from 12-9pm Friday, 12-9pm Saturday, and 12-5pm on Sunday. A tasting glass is \$6, and 4 oz. tastes of beer are \$1 each. A \$1 discount is given in exchange for three cans of organic food for the Oregon Food Bank or presenting a validated MAX light rail ticket.


# HOWDY NEIGHBOR!



Always receptive to new people jumping in and helping out, the Board is a group that welcomes all who want to join, no matter their level of interest or abilities.

If you can answer yes to any of those ques-

tions, then OKNA is looking for you!

Opportunities for participation include, but are not limited to:

#### **Secretary:**

The basic responsibilities include taking notes/minutes at both our General and Board meetings and distributing them. If you are someone who is more comfortable listening rather than speaking and prefer being a 'fly on the wall,' then this job is right for you. Taking minutes is not difficult, especially if you bring your laptop to the meetings, but it is an essential part of meetings. Board members would be ecstatic and grateful to see this position filled.

#### **Environmental Chair:**

Duties required for this position are pretty broad; basically it's up to the individual to bring it alive. A person who has a passion for keeping our environment clean and who is up on the "green" movement could fill this niche in OKNA. The role of this position is to report to OKNA any relevant changes, plans or issues of transportation affecting the Overlook Neighborhood. This person would be in regular communication with the Portland Bureau of Transportation, the Oregon De-

partment of Transportation, and Tri-met. Pedestrian concerns and bicycle use would also fall under this person's purview.

### **Area Representatives:**

These individuals serve as a voice for specific geographical areas in the Overlook Neighborhood. Representatives should be able to communicate to the Board any specific concerns that their neighbors may have. They can take on specific issues or projects that they think are needed for their own area or for the neighborhood as a whole.

These specific positions are what we currently have available, however OKNA is open to creating new positions and/or accepting other forms of help. As our neighborhood grows and becomes more popular, participation from resident is crucial and the Board is reaching out to find the ways for you to participate.

Since our last issue appeared, we've been brainstorming more ways for you to be involved (hey, check out the Overlook Social Club in the next column over!) and we're excited to see more new faces at our monthly General Meetings (3rd Tuesday of the month at Kaiser Town Hall) and at our volunteer opportunities. You don't need to be somebody famous or have already put in X number of hours with OKNA to qualify; your enthusiasm and willingness to raise your voice and hand to help is the only advanced degree we're looking for.

When I moved back to Portland in '86, my wife and I rented an apartment at NW 20<sup>th</sup> and Overton and I found work at a printing outfit at NW 19<sup>th</sup> and Raleigh. What a commute! Five minutes on foot. Where we choose to live and to work are the biggest "transportation" decisions we make. If you live in Overlook and work on Swan Island, you know how sweet it is and how many hours your brief commute adds to your life every week.

S w a n I s l a n d T M A (Transportation Management Association), the project I manage, seeks to reduce single occupancy vehicle trips to, from and around Swan Island. The fact is, transit

and bike options work best if you don't live too far away. Since 2007, the TMA has promoted living close to where you work with its "N/NE PDX TNT...Trip Not Taken" project.

"TNT...Trip Not Taken" has increased the awareness of Swan Island employees about adjacent neighborhoods and business districts as places to live, shop and play. This project has also worked closely with Portland Community College's Cascade Campus and Metro Workforce Center to help those already living in north and inner northeast Portland to learn about the job and career possibilities on Swan Island.

At PCC/Cascade Jobs Fair in early May, I spoke with several hundred job seekers and handed out information about the range of employment opportunities just down at the end of the # 72 Kill-

ingsworth bus line. Unfortunately, employers currently hiring are the exception, but we can expect things to get better before too long.

In partnership with APNBA (Alliance of Portland Neighborhood Business Associations), "TNT...Trip Not Taken" published "Historic North/Northeast Portland Today,"

# Interstate Farmers Market: Fruits, Veggies, and Small Business Incubation

On the opening day of the 2009 Interstate Farmers Market season, I was eager to get down to see what was new, what was returning and if there were any berries yet (okay, so I rushed the season a bit on that one...). But one thing I was certain I'd find was a group of earnest, fresh and prepared food vendors, some of whom were getting their first chance at a retail presence through our neighborhood farmers market.

While not an official part of the market's mission, the Interstate Farmers Market does strive to select at least a few vendors each year representing businesses that are new or have recently started up. "As a board, we really enjoy this, we're really thrilled to help give these newcomers an opportunity to build their businesses," says Erin McGovney, Chair of the Interstate Farmers Market Board of Directors. "When choosing each year's selection of vendors we definitely look for those that may be just starting out but that have also demonstrated some strength in running their business so far. And then we do our best to set everyone up for success."

For the vendors, the market is a good option for trying out their retail and customer service skills. Many are operating on a shoestring budget and maintaining a store just isn't an option yet. But a little practice can go a long way.

Dave's Killer Bread is a brand and story that many Portlanders know. Since 2005, Dave Dahl, a four-time ex-con and son of Nature-Bake founder James Dahl has grown a highly successful company making delicious whole grain sandwich breads that can be found in grocery stores across Oregon and Washington. What a lot of Portlanders may not know is that the Interstate Farmers Market was one of the company's very first farmers market stalls, before their launch into selling through large retailers.

Other start-up vendors from past years include Micro Mercantes, Nonna's Noodles, Sweet Leaf Farms, and Barker Bones. New participants in this informal program in 2009 are vendors Lillikoi (Laotian baked goods and food vendor), St. John's Coffee Roasters, and J & K Growers, a newly founded farm enterprise from The Dalles.

So if you needed another reason to come down to the market each week (besides all of the delicious fresh and prepared goodies and a chance to catch up with your neighbors) now you've got it: knowing that you're supporting micro-economic development and small business growth in our community and region.

# Where Do All the Farmers Market Leftovers Go?

While it would be great if every fresh food vendor at the market sold out by the end of Wednesday evening, the reality is there is always something left over. So what happens to all that extra bounty? Well, anything the vendors don't wish to cart home with them is picked up every week without fail by the

Carpenter's Food Bank.

"This is one of the most difficult parts of managing a farmers market—getting good, nutritious food remainders to a food bank for use by the needy" says Erin McGovney, Interstate Farmers Market Board Chair. "Each week the people of the Carpenter's Food Bank quietly come and go at the end of the market. They are the ones that make this possible, for the market to get this fresh, extra food to people who really need it."

The Carpenter's Food Bank was started in 1983 by a group of Carpenter and Steelworker union locals in North Portland who wanted a way to provide food to the hungry families of out-of-work and striking union members. 25 years later, the food bank now serves any individual or family in the community that comes to them for food assistance. Each month from their location at North Lombard and Brandon Avenue they distribute between 450 and 650 boxes of food.

### The New North Police Precinct

What will it mean for the Overlook Neighborhood?

As you may have read or heard elsewhere, this year's City budget process called for cuts everywhere and one noticeable change is in the Portland Police Precinct Restructuring Plan. The plan entails merging the current five patrol precincts into three larger precincts effective June 11<sup>th</sup>.

Overlook will receive police services from the new North precinct, which you have known as the NE precinct, located at 449 NE Emerson St. (MLK and Killingsworth area). Commander Jim Ferraris, currently Commander in the same office, will lead patrol response from Kelley Point Park & Linnton out to about I-84/185<sup>th</sup> Ave.

"What about us?" was the natural response from area residents; it certainly sounds like fewer resources will be farther away but the very good news for Overlook and environs is that the plan will not change the patrol districts.

That means the same patrol cars assigned to Overlook remain where they have always been, with the officers who already know our area best staying right

What does change is the precinct building the officers report to for the beginning and end of their shift. We should not anticipate

any changes or impacts to our police services and response times with this new plan. We might even come out better if officers are responding from the precinct, since it is now closer to Overlook than the old North building in St Johns. This 'old' North building in St Johns will continue to be staffed by a Police Desk Clerk Monday through Friday.

Another key component to this restructuring plan is that Council approved keeping the current number of Neighborhood Response Officers or NRT's as we call them. These fantastic Officers work directly with Crime Prevention and our residents to address specific crime related problems and work as a team to prevent and address unique criminal activity to each area. This was a big save for our community policing programs and it was encouraging to see our Commissioners keeping the vital NRT program intact and preserving our crime prevention programs.

The Police Bureau and Crime Prevention have been working hard to make this transition as smooth and efficient as possible. I will remain your assigned Crime Prevention Coordinator and I will remain at the Kenton

Community Contact Office in downtown Kenton. The economic recession has caused many very difficult decisions to be made, but our dedicated and hard working Police Officers will continue to serve the Overlook neighborhood as they always have. Please remember we are all part of the public safety system and our Officers need our assistance and support to do their job well. As always, please don't hesitate to contact me if you would like more information on the restructuring plan or any general crime prevention questions.



### Our Bluff Parklet Gets Some **Needed Attention**

Do you remember when the Boy in The Velveteen Rabbit loved his toy rabbit so much that he rubbed the pink off the Rabbit's nose and the whiskers off his face? Well, our little neighborhood "park" at the bluff end of both Skidmore Terrace and Skidmore Court is going through a bit of a similar experience. More than 30 neighbors recently came together to make sure that it gets the special positive attention they believe it deserves.

Just a few acres in size, the parklet (alternatively referred to as "Skidmore Bluffs" and "Mocks Crest Bluffs") has historically been a quiet spot where mostly neighbors would linger while on their walks to watch the sun set or the activities on Swan Island and the Willamette River. But it's not so quiet any more.

With the mention of this viewpoint spot in several publications and blogs, the number of visitors has increased dramatically in the past two years. Unfortunately, a minority of them have been the cause of graffiti, vandalism, drug dealing, trash, unleashed dogs, trespass-

ing, and other just plain rude behavior affecting the quality of life of nearby residents.

The good news is that our city partners (Portland Parks & Recreation, Portland Police and Office of Neighborhood Involvement) are ready and willing to help. During the recent meeting, PP&R staff informed us that the parklet area is actually owned by several city bureaus and one individual. So, they are actively working to consolidate the ownership under PP&R, which will grant the entire space "park" status and corresponding protection under their rules and regulations.

In the meantime, on a regular basis, PP&R maintenance staff will mow and remove trash and Parks rangers will patrol the parklet. Mark Wells, the North Portland Community Prevention Coordinator, has distributed a flyer to residents in the immediate area with contact numbers to various city resources and information on how to document properly and report criminal activity. No matter what the issue, neighbors are encouraged to call the nonemergency police number 503.823.3333 whenever they see problems occurring there.

### **Grow Tomatoes in Overlook**

In the last issue of Overlook Views, Pat Collins made some great suggestions for incorporating vegetables into your garden this year. I want to take that one step further: if you grow only one kind of vegetable this summer, consider tomatoes. They're easy to grow, and there's just nothing like the warm, sweet, vine-ripened goodness of your own homegrown tomatoes.

If you don't have room in the ground for tomatoes, don't worry you can grow them in big pots. That way you can pick the sunniest spot available for them along your driveway, or on a

patio or deck. Tomatoes need at least 5-6 hours of direct sun daily, but almost everyone has enough sun exposure for a pot or two somewhere in the front or back yard.

Whether you grow them in a pot or in the ground, here are a few tips that will help your tomato crop achieve maximum flavor:

**Soil:** In pots, use a quality potting mix that contains peat (for moisture retention) and perlite (to keep the soil light and well drained.) Don't use garden soil in pots – it's too heavy and dense.

**Amendments:** Whether you plant in pots or in the ground, dig a small amount of lime into the soil a couple of weeks before plant-

ing. Lime is basic and helps neutralize our Northwest soil that's typically more acidic than tomatoes and other warm-weather vegetables prefer. Add a balanced fertilizer as you plant, and several times during the summer, top-dress the plants by working a small amount of fertilizer into the surface of the soil.

Water: Water regularly, and don't let the soil dry out until well into fall. Consistent watering helps

prevent the blossom end-rot that can ruin tomatoes. Water in the morning, and avoid watering the foliage or the fruit: that tends to encourage powdery mildew. There's a tomato for everyone, from the hybrid beefsteak type that are perfect for hamburgers, to unusual and delicious heirloom varieties. Early and Oregon-bred types such as **Early Girl** and **Oregon Spring** are more reliable if we have a cool summer. If you have the room for more than one plant, try both hybrid and heirloom types. We'll grow three along our sunny driveway this summer, but choosing which three is always the hardest part!

So choose your tomatoes, plant, water, harvest when ripe, then enjoy your own, delicious home-grown summer goodness!

# Free Water Gauge & Garden Fame

Last issue's water article told us about the Regional Water Providers Consortium and their free Weekly Watering Number. Designed to help us conserve water, especially for lawns, the number factors in the weather and calculates how much supplemental watering we gardeners will need to do. Part of watering correctly is knowing how much volume your sprinkler system is putting out, and your FREE water gauge is your new measure. Surf over to conserveh2o.org for more details on the Weekly Watering Number and how to get your water gauge or call 503.823.7528.

Since we're just now rolling into the driest part of the Oregon year, here are five easy watering tips to help you conserveh2o:

- 1: Water lawns and gardens before 10 a.m. or after 6 p.m. to slow evaporation it can save as much as 300 gallons of water per month!
- 2: Fertilizers increase water consumption, so apply the minimum amount of fertilizer necessary
- **3:** Aerate! It prevents runoff and gives water easier access to the root systems.
- **4:** Mow your lawn high and often. Cutting your lawn higher (2–3 inches tall) encourages a stronger root system and reduces evaporation
- **5:** Select a sprinkler that releases water slowly and close to the ground rather than one that releases a mist, which tends to evaporate quickly.


