Another resident, speaking about safety and walkability issues, explained "I can walk around at any time and feel safe...I love seeing people in their yards and I love the smell

However, a major concern that was brought up during a focus group on safety issues was the fact that off-leash dogs not only concerned them, but caused them to limit their outdoor activity, as well as that of one of their grandchildren who is scared of dogs. Overall, residents expressed many more positive aspects of the neighborhood (e.g., public transit, outdoor spaces) than negative (e.g., parking near the MAX line, traffic patterns); however, there is still much to learn and action that can be taken to improve the neighborhood's livability.

On August 7th, the students had an opportunity to present their findings to neighborhood residents at Kaiser Town Hall. Watch for follow up details in future Overlook Views.


More than 12,000 people attended last year's festival, making it the largest Polish Festival in the United States west of Chicago.


## Overlook's Brush With Hollywood

Several Portland State University students from the senior Capstone course titled Creating Livable Communities for an Aging Society have been working with residents to learn more about what makes Overlook livable for its aging population.

Although Overlook does not have as many older residents as Hollywood - the other neighborhood in the project (according to the 2000 U.S. Census Bureau 9.7% in Overlook were aged 65+, as compared to 27% in Hollywood) – both neighborhoods are expecting to age considerably with the first Baby Boomers reaching the age of 65 in the year 2011. The course - a pilot project supported by the neighborhood association, the City of Portland, Multnomah County, Elders in Action, and AARP – engaged in a walking assessment and focus groups to identify age-friendly features and barriers in the neighborhood.

Comments from the focus groups included the feeling that Overlook is "a gem of North Portland" and a place that many do not want to leave, even as they age. One resident, who knew that she could not live in her multi-story home as her physical needs changed, jumped at the opportunity to purchase a ranch-style home a block away so that she could stay in the neighborhood as long as possible. Unfortunately, the housing stock in the neighborhood does not have many of these options and

Here's a reminder of just some of the involvement opportunities available:

#### Speak up:

Every neighbor in Overlook has something of value to contribute. The trick is finding the time. The Neighborhood Association can only be responsive to your wants and needs if you tell us. If you are sure you don't have time for a big job, please come to a meeting, drop us an email, or place a phone call so that we know you are there, and what you need. There are lots of short-term ways to be involved as well. (write a piece for the Overlook Views!)

#### **Secretary:**

The role of a Secretary is to take and distribute minutes at our General and Board meetings. The function of a Secretary is vital to a neighborhood association; they ensure communication and the archiving of information. If you are someone who is more of a listener rather then a speaker and/or if communications is your specialty then you'd be perfect for this niche within the Association.

#### **Environmental Chair:**

The capacity of the Environmental Chair will be simply what that person makes it. Generally, this person maintains contact with the Bureau of Environmental Services and address any environmental concerns to the neighborhood. The basic responsibilities of the Transportation Chair are to keep tabs on notifications from the Portland Bureau of Transportation & the Oregon Dept. of Transportation and to communicate traffic issues to the neighborhood. Someone who has

submitted to utilize the funds. The Light Post Project was the top choice of the Grant Committee, the OKNA Board, and finally approved in a unanimous vote during a general meeting of the Overlook Neighborhood Association. Neighbors and community members played an active role in the design of the poles. The original short, old fashioned pole design was changed upon receiving input from neighbors concerned with night glare. Ideas were gather and utilized regarding the look and light quality of the replacement poles. As a result, a unique pole design will be employed for this project. Northstar Electrical Contractors, a local company, was awarded the bid to construct

## Willamette Bluff Light Post Neighborhood Improvement Project

Construction began on the Willamette Bluff Light Post project the week of July 27. The project is located on the Willamette Boulevard bluff between N Killingsworth Street and N Curtis Avenue and is immediately north of the eighty-foothigh industrial pole where it all began (see below for more details). The project will replace fifteen old wooden street light poles and their overhead wiring with fifteen new decorative poles with underground wiring.

This scenic stretch of road is a low-traffic sidestreet, used not only by the Portland Marathon, the Bridge Pedal, and Sunday Parkways, but used daily by bikers, bike commuters, walkers, runners, and people stopping to picnic, play with their dogs and kids, or simply enjoy the sunset. During construction the open space along the top of the bluff will be closed to the public for safety; the construction process will include digging trenches for the underground electrical wire as well as deep holes for the new light post foundations, so please respect the construction zone. The construction will of course be inconvenient, especially during these warm months, but keep in mind the long term benefit: The new lighting sources will enhance the pedestrian environment in this truly distinctive location of the public realm for years to come.

A brief project history: This neighborhood improvement project is funded by \$80,000 in grant money provide by PGE (Portland General Electric) and BES (Bureau of Environmental Services). The funds were offered to make amends for the rules that were broken when erecting the eighty-foot-high industrial pole with high tension power lines, located on the bluff to feed electricity to the Swan Island Pumping Station. Seven grants were

In conjunction with the OKNA's Willamette Bluff Light Post Project, a demonstration study will be performed to evaluate energy-efficient street light technologies.

The demonstration study will compare the street light technology that the city of Portland has been using since the 1980's, which is High-pressure Sodium (HPS), with newer more-efficient LED and Induction technologies. Specifically, five of each light source type (e.g., HPS, LED, and Induction) will be installed. Light levels, light color and other aspects will be recorded and compared, the surrounding neighborhood community will be asked for their feedback, and a report will be prepared to document the results of the study.

The results of the study will be published on the US Department of Energy's website. The study is being performed in partnership with the Bureau of Transportation, the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability, U.S. Department of Energy, Pacific Northwest National Laboratory, Energy Trust of Oregon, and several street light manufacturers.

Within the year, once the study is completed, the recommended lights will be installed in the 15-pole street light system.

## A Shipbuilding Tour

As I wait to pass through the security gate at the Vigor Industrial (VI) Portland Shipyard, the massive sheds of the Kaiser shipbuilding days of WWII loom up on the right. Seagoing vessels are still fabricated there. On the left behind some trees sits the latest military-type vessel, an FSF (Fast Sea Fighter, a block long, jet-powered catamaran) that, visible as it is, isn't a subject for discussion on the record.

Once inside the gate I proceed slowly, watching for forklifts and other bicyclists; on a busy day almost a thousand skilled workers are employed by VI, its partners and tenants.

Amy Hill, VI's communication manager, meets me for a tour starting with the two seagoing barges in final stages of construction by US Barge, a joint venture of VI and Oregon Iron Works. They sit in what was once the shipyard parking lot, a much more productive use of industrial land than storing employee automobiles. Seagoing, double-hulled barges are in demand; the next to launch is the "Nathan Schmidt" for Harley Petroleum.

Vigor Industrial's Portland Shipyard is one of only three on the West Coast with the capacity to raise, lower and dry dock seagoing vessels. The Shipyard tank farm, built to clean ship ballast tanks, now cleans rail tank cars as well as separates and disposes of the mess scooped up from oil spills.

Dry dock #1 and 3 are in operation for routine maintenance and repair of barges, ferries (Alaska Marine Highway), and navy ships of the Military Sealift Command. Dry dock #2 is being dismantled for its old growth lumber.

On the lagoon side of the yard, Tyco's cablelaying ship, Global Sentinel, has its home berth alongside ocean survey ships that are being refitted for civilian operations. Two ospreys land on a nearby crane, a roost convenient to the water as well as to their nest on a utility pole with platform provided by V.I.

While young ospreys learn how to fish in the lagoon, young Portlanders learn the art of welding at the Swan Island Training Center, a joint venture of V.I. and PCC. Upon graduation, they can cross the crane tracks to find work at Columbia Wire and Iron, a long-time yard

tenant that does custom metal fabrication (including Paul Allen's Experience Music Project in Seattle).

And that's not all. I've yet to note Specialty Finishes where they sandblast and paint, among other things, massive anchor chains; Vigor Machine, which provides precision machining; and Cascade General that outfits newly built navy ships from the shipyards in San Diego.



## Welcome Market Manager, Laresa Beck

How did you come to be the new Manager of the Interstate Farmers Market? Tell us about your background and what drove your interest in taking on this role?

I've been an Interstate Farmers Market customer since its very first day in 2005, and I've been a volunteer with the market this season since opening day. Professionally, I have a background in grocery marketing that comes from three years with New Seasons Market, as a Demo Department Manager for the Sellwood

Store. I bring a lot of experience in customer service, as well as experience working with many local food vendors, including Unger Farms who are currently at the Interstate Farmers Market, and Dave's Killer Bread, who have sold at the market in the past.

I've been interested in working for a communitybased non profit in the North/Northeast Portland area for awhile now, and was excited when I heard there was a search on for a new market manager. I'm also a foodie—I love to cook and bake, and I have my own organic home garden in North Portland.

What is your vision for the Interstate Farmer's Market? What should we be looking for in the future?

Going forward, the community should be on the lookout for more special events at the market throughout the summer season. This month [July] we'll have Blueberry Fest, featuring a guest chef doing a cooking demo at the market, Ima Blueberry—the giant talking blueberry, and lots of kids activities. We are also dedicated to consistently having a good balance of veggie and prepared food vendors each week.

We'll also be getting more seasonal recipes out to the community, to help people make the most of the summer's bounty week-by-week.

## Can you comment on what role you see the community playing in the market?

Each week at the market people are coming up to talk with me and share their ideas. This is important. It's only when we know first-hand what people are thinking and what they want that we can address those issues.

Also, market supporters can help us with their word-of-mouth influence—invite your friends and family to meet you at the market, have a bite to eat and support the farmers.

Lastly...

There are a lot of farmers markets in Portland now, and people have choices about which markets to support. But what makes the Interstate Farmers Market so strong is our dedication to the immediate communities of North and inner

Northeast Portland. That's what sets us apart from many of the larger farmers market enterprises in Portland. Ours is and always has been a community-owned market, run by and for the community.

## And, Farewell Frank...

After a lifetime of neighborhood service former resident, current landlord and beloved mail carrier, Frank Spitulski retired early this vear from the US Postal Service.

## That Darn Plane!

For several years now, we've been occasionally aware of a small plane circling North Portland. While guessing who was doing what was amusing for a while, curiosity finally drove me to discover that the small plane is actually the Air Support Unit of the Portland Police Bureau. They have provided investigative support functions since 1991 but have only had their own Cessna 172 since 1999. The Air Support Unit is staffed by 18 people who are licensed pilots and observers. They use cameras and night vision equipment to monitor car and foot chases around the city, increasing officer and civilian safety (car chases in particular are very dangerous to uninvolved drivers). You may notice them on regular patrol for four or more hours at a time, and now you'll finally know what they are up to.

## IFCC: Your Cultural Art Center

Not a month goes by without someone popping by the Interstate Firehouse Cultural Center asking "What is this place?".

To help answer that question last fall IFCC added a beautiful new marquee designed by Overlook artist Mike Suri. It not only lets you know what's happening at IFCC through the LED sign, it's a prized piece of public art overseen by the Regional Arts and Culture Council. Mike's design honors the building and brings the energy of what happens inside the building—outside.

The building is a firehouse built in 1911, now owned by Portland Parks and Recreation. IFCC is a nonprofit that works independently but in partnership with Parks. The group was created in 1982 by Portland's first African American elected official, Commissioner Charles Jordan to provide a platform to address diversity through art as well as to foster diversity within the arts. IFCC has a 99 seat live theatre, an art gallery and dance studio. At the time of writing this we have one full time

and two part time employees who support visual and performing artists of all kinds.

IFCC has something for everyone; this season's performances span hip hop to opera, but not your grandma's opera. Recent performances include the very original 'Maelstrom – The Zombie Opera', and local rock opera 'Chariots of Rubber' as well as 'Hansel and Gretel'.

'Ursula' is an intense play about the 10th century saint including sex, love, mystery AND 10,000 virgins! This show kicks off the season, and runs from September 11—October 3, followed by World Stage Theater's production of a new play, 'Too Good To Be True' by local writer Shalonda Simms.

Last Thursday Gallery celebrations are held nearly every month; on September 24, join us in the Gallery for the opening of WORD: A Celebration of Font and Text. Our annual show partners with Wordstock and Slow Food Portland, so check our website for fun food-literature based events throughout October.

Watch for more opera when 'Sherman' opens December 10. IFCC commissioned this jazz opera from Thara Memory; the story revolves around real-life sax player

Sherman, who was a legend in our neighborhood and Portland. He died tragically in the early 70s.

'Wise Men'. This exhibit features the work of three African American artists who were part of a burgeoning N/NE Portland movement in the 1960s-70s. They converged with Thara Memory at a studio on Alberta long before it was an arts district. 'Wise Men' includes Charles Tatum, Philemon Reid and Issaka Shamsud-Din, whose murals can be seen in North Portland.

Our final opera of the season, 'Queen of Knives' is written by the lead singer of Vagabond Opera. His company and a cadre of local performers will tear it up in their intercontinental gypsy jazz style in May.

But don't wait 'til then to drop by, stop in this month to see 'The Dog Show: Celebrating all things Canine'. Dog loving painters and photographers introduce you to beautiful, soulful and sometimes hard working pooches.

## Patton Park Apartments: Home Sweet Home

Our lease-up of Patton Park is almost complete; all 54 residential apartments and <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of the commercial space are now leased. I thought this would be a good time to update OKNA on your new neighbors.

#### **Residential Tenants**

Patton Park Apartments is now home to 106 residents, including 45 children under 18. Over half of these families moved to Patton Park from other housing in the neighborhood. Many of the other apartments in the building are now rented to families who grew up in the area or lived there formerly, and they welcomed the opportunity to move back to their former neighborhood. REACH is pleased that we have been able to fulfill the Interstate Corridor Urban Renewal Plan goal to provide benefits to existing neighborhood residents, especially those in danger of displacement due to rising rents.

#### **Commercial Tenants**

OKNA and TriMet both expressed a preference for the project to include ground floor commercial space to activate the street level and help create a pedestrian-friendly environment. Patton Park includes about 4,600 square feet of commercial space on the ground floor, most of which is concentrated at the south and north ends of the building. We're pleased to announce that we've leased the corner spaces to two local, family-friendly businesses. Both will open in early July.

Aprende Con Amigos will occupy the southend space at Interstate and Emerson. Aprende is a locally-owned Spanish-immersion preschool that is licensed to serve up to 30 children. Aprende's owner, Stacy Alonso, chose to locate at our building because of its great location next to Patton Square Park. Aprende will join Trillium School in using the park and playground as outdoor space for its students, which will reinforce the park as a familyfriendly place. We are delighted to welcome Aprende; N/NE Portland is underserved by preschools and Aprende will be a wonderful complement to Beach Elementary School, which offers a Spanish-immersion curriculum. Aprende is currently accepting kids for the 2009/10 school year.

# **Portland Community Land Trust (PCLT)** is a local non-profit organization with a mission to develop affordable homes for sale to first-time home-buyers. PCLT was founded in 1999 and to date it has helped 100 families become homeowners, including many in N/NE Portland neighborhoods. The Executive Director, **Jesse Beason**, is the former interim director of IFCC. PCLT has outgrown its former office space and is delighted to be able to relocate its office in the Patton Park Project.

We hope OKNA will join us in welcoming our new residents and commercial tenants. REACH is honored that we can part of the renaissance of the Interstate Corridor and we greatly value our partnership with OKNA.

## Burn to Learn Live Fire Training at N Prescott

Portland Fire & Rescue has been given the unique opportunity to do a series of 'live fire' burns at the Sierra Construction Co site at N Interstate & Prescott. The live burns had been scheduled to take place in early August but due to the weather, PF&R is rescheduling for later in the month. Burns may be completed by the time you read this.

But what have they been doing, and why? It's all very interesting actually. Firemen are using the old houses to create situations that allow the firefighters to practice search and rescue techniques, laddering and use their specialized tools on actual structures instead of plywood substitutes. These exercises are extremely important to the firefighters, as evidenced by the passion of the presentations made to OKNA and to passing neighbors.

I spoke with Lt Hartsock at the end of July and he reports that techniques practiced at the site were used in an apartment fire where they encountered similar structures; he was thrilled that the practice was put directly to use.

During June and July, firefighters had appliances (fire trucks, cutting tools, etc.) on site during the week, affording a rare synchronicity of solutions to the problems the site presented. Daily practice sessions were held in five different structure stations, and partici-

pants came from the training division on NE 122nd Ave as well as from duty firehouses throughout the city. Training was conducted during regular shift scheduling, to maximize pay and time available.

Captain Kyle Wochnick, Training Lt Rob Hartsock and Chief Davies have been very generous with their explanations to so many interested neighbors. They offered a presentation at the site when training began in June and visited the OKNA General Meeting on July 21 to keep us updated and to again express their excitement at the opportunity. It's been 3 1/2 years since Portland Fire

& Rescue has had a chance like this to have a live fire outside of the controlled environment of the training station.

Neighbors concerned about pollution and toxins were quickly reassured. The buildings have been stripped of problem items; oil tanks removed, asbestos siding abated, all furniture cleared out. The intense heat of a fire like this completely incinerates anything that is left and draws it well out of our immediate atmosphere.

Burning will only occur if it is safe for the firefighters and the neighborhood. The response from neighbors to the email call for volunteers to canvas the area in advance of the burn was quite enthusiastic, and Overlookers impressed Lt Hartsock!

When the burns are all completed, The Rebuilding Center has been contracted to conduct a sustainable deconstruction of the remaining buildings. While somewhat slower than plowing it all down, this method can save and reuse up to 85% of the remaining construction materials. The Portland Development Commission has provided a grant for the demolition.

This has been described as a win-win situation for everyone and is the result of neighbors like yourself speaking up and asking for what we need. Overlook will soon have a secure, green space awaiting development, Portland Fire & Rescue members gain valuable training and an area non-profit achieves its aims. What an outstanding community result!

## TRIMET The Yellow Line to PSU

All that construction on the Steel Bridge and bus mall in downtown Portland is finished! Light rail tracks have been installed and everything else rebuilt. Now that the dust has settled, the trains will start using the new tracks on Sunday, August 30. The Yellow Line goes first and will split off from the Red and Blue Lines at the west end of the Steel Bridge and head down to Union Station then use 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> Avenues to get to and from PSU. No more trips on 1<sup>st</sup> Ave or Morrison & Yamhill to the Galleria stop.

Two weeks later, the Green Line trains will start taking riders along the same alignment in downtown. These trains start at Clackamas Town Center, head up alongside I-205 to Gateway then next to I-84 to the Lloyd District and the Rose Quarter. September 12 is opening day, and **free rides** are available after 11:30 a.m.

The old easy way to transfer between the southbound Yellow Line and the eastbound Red and Blue Lines at the Old Town/Chinatown station won't work anymore due to the changes. However, one could catch the eastbound Green


Line at Union Station or walk across the Rose Quarter. Riders transferring to the westbound Red and Blue Lines should ride the Yellow Line all the way to the Pioneer Place stops

You may have heard of the service cuts that TriMet is making this fall. Most of North Portland is spared, but the Yellow Line will have reduced service after 9:30 each night. Also, some of the southbound Yellow Line trains will turn into Red or Blue eastbound trains each evening. These trains will take you to the Rose Quarter platform under I-5 so those headed downtown and beyond can change to a west-


