



# Lucky Lab Coming to Former Roux Site

When New Orleans-inspired restaurant Roux closed its doors suddenly last July, many wondered what might take its place, and how soon. By the fall, rumors started circulating that local Portland brew pub company Lucky Lab might possibly move into the site at 1700 N Killingsworth. Since then, it's been a

waiting game to see if that would play out. Well, now it's final.

A recent call to the folks at Lucky Lab confirmed that they were in late stages of buying the former Roux site, with the sale to be final by the end of January. According to Gary Geist of Lucky Lab, the plan is that with the sale complete it will then be another three or four weeks of prepwork to get the establishment ready for opening. An early March debut is hoped for at this point.

For those not familiar with the Lucky Lab Brewing Company, the

locally owned brewery was founded in 1994 and currently has three other pub locations—the Hawthorne Brew Pub on 9th and Hawthorne, the Quimby Beer Hall at 19th and NW Quimby, and the Multnomah Village Public House on Capitol Highway. Lucky Lab serves a selection of eight or so of its own handcrafted ales at each location, along with a full food menu at each, including pizza, sandwiches, salads, sides, and kid-friendly fare.



#### OKNA Gardening Recipes Start a Garden Recipe Collection

Let's have fun and exchange a favorite vegetable recipe or two! I walk the neighborhood and have noticed the vegetable gardens (new, old and expanded) or a vegetable plant or two among the roses and lilies.

As more of us than ever before are gardening for actual food for the table, some inspiration is in order. With a little planning ahead, maybe we can start our vegetable gardens with some actual meals in mind, so we don't wind up with too many zucchinis and too few eggplants. Like many established veggie gardeners, I always need a new idea for a vegetable recipe. Do you? Maybe some of you who are new to growing food aren't sure what you can use, when and how much of it you might want.

TIP: If you're going to want peppers, start them off early! Peppers and eggplant are two veggies that take a while to get going here and need all the sunshine they can get.

I've started us off with one of my staple recipes, using delicious green bush beans that start early and pay off quickly.

Bush green bean seeds are planted in soil of 60 degrees. Beans like warm soil and our soil warms up after May 15th. Most beans are ready



to pick 2 weeks after the bloom. The fertilizer needs to be light with the nitrogen. This variety of beans have a range of growing season from 55 to 75 days.

#### Roasted Green Beans

from Cook's Illustrated magazine Nov/Dec 2005

Preheat oven to 450 degrees

1 pound of green beans, 1 tablespoon olive oil, and 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper are tossed together in bowl.

Combine 1 tablespoon minced garlic, 1 teaspoon minced fresh ginger, 2 teaspoons honey, 1/2 teaspoon toasted sesame oil, and 1/4 teaspoon hot red pepper flakes in bowl.

Roast green beans on baking sheet lined with aluminum foil for 10 minutes. Remove baking sheet from oven.

Add HOT green beans to oil mixture and coat. Return to oven and roast until dark golden brown in spots or 10 to 12 minutes. Remove

Sprinkle 4 teaspoons of toasted sesame seeds and serve.

#### Street Tree Pruning Social Club

To help take care of the recently planted street trees in Overlook Neighborhood, Portland Parks & Recreation Neighborhood Tree Stewards have organized four street tree pruning workshops this spring. Since 1999, Friends of Trees has planted over 800 street trees in Overlook. With your help we can prune these young trees to insure they develop good branching structure, a strong trunk and do not block the sidewalk with low branches. Working with the Portland's Urban Forestry Division, volunteers will prune street trees for health and safety.

Portland city code requires that tree branches must be higher than 7.5 feet over the sidewalk and 11 feet over the road. Volunteers will focus on pruning low branches that block pedestrian traffic but will also prune dead and broken branches, double leaders, and crossing branches. All pruning will be done to proper pruning standards according to the International Society of Arboriculture.

By pruning trees when they are young we are able to identify small issues that can grow into bigger issues. If you would like to have your trees pruned or know of trees that are in need of pruning please call 503-823-1650. Each adjacent property owner will be notified by mail about the pruning and be able to opt-out of the pruning.


If the homeowner is going to prune a street tree themselves, they will need a street tree pruning permit issued by the Urban Forestry Division. The permit is free and in-



## Do You *Know* Your Neighborhood?

An earthquake stronger than the one that hit Haiti is due in the Pacific Northwest sometime within the next 50 years! When that happens, will you know your neighbors sufficiently well to know who should be home, who has special needs, who has children, who has equipment and supplies?

Or are you like most of us? You know your neighbors well enough to nod and say hello or even have a chat about some change in the neighborhood. But you know very little about the details of their lives or even how to contact them if they were needed urgently at home.

What's different about you and the people of Haiti? You can prepare. You can store supplies. You can make sure your house and your belongings are set up the best way possible for such a scenario. You can set up a disaster plan with your family so they will have the best chance of survival and will know how to reach each other after a major event that messes up our regular communication systems. And you can set up disaster plans with your neighbors.

The Know Your Neighborhood training is designed to build community and strengthen readiness among neighbors. This tool provides easy to follow steps for preparedness and crime prevention, while you get to know your neighbors. Training topics include: 9 Steps Immediately Following Disaster, Preventing Crime in Your Neighborhood, Inventory the Neighborhood, etc.

You can schedule a Know Your Neighborhood presentation in your neighborhood or church or community group. A disaster response volunteer and a crime prevention representative will give you very useful information to help you and your neighbors be ready for a major event like an earthquake, fire or major winter storm when firefighters and police are overwhelmed with requests for help and could be slowed down by impassable streets and other damage. This short, 45 minute presentation is a perfect stepping stone to a neighborhood

#### Starting or Reviving a Neighborhood Watch

You might be wondering - what exactly is a neighborhood watch, what will I have to do, or how much time does it take to get one started in my neighborhood? It is surprisingly easy and takes much less time than most people would think. The rewards can certainly make up for the time and effort you put into it including lowering crime in your area, getting to know your neighbors, enhancing your sense of community, and working alongside your Portland Police Officers and crime prevention staff to team up against criminal activ-

So...you're interested in starting or revitalizing a Neighborhood Watch?

Here is what you can do to get the ball rolling. One of the most important parts is having one or



neighbors two who are willing to serve as the Organizer or sometimes called the Block Captain. This person is responsible making sure the initial work is completed and helps recruit other neighbors into the process.

Once you have an Organizer, the next steps include:

-Meet with your local Crime Prevention Coordinator and let them know you are forming a Neighborhood Watch. (he loves to have coffee ...

-Get a neighbor or two to help and decide what area you are going to organize and what crime issues you want to address.

- -Decide on a time, date, and location for the first meeting and make sure your Crime Prevention Coordinator is invited and can attend the meeting.
- -Deliver invitations to the neighbors you are organizing to announce the first meeting and training.
- -Attend the initial meeting and training which last about two hours.
- -Meet once or twice a year to discuss any issues, update contact information, and keep the Watch thriving.

That's really all there is to it. Your organizer is responsible for creating a simple block map with each neighbors contact information and a phone tree and after you attend the two hour initial training, you are off and running. Neighborhood Watch really can reduce the crime in your neighborhood and improve your neighborhood's safety and sense of community. #### Overlook Real Estate Update

If you read the papers, you might think the world was coming to an end, and that real estate values are crashing faster than an out of control car at the Indy 500. Home prices are down here in Portland, but have not fallen as much as in most other markets across the country. But what are some of the figures locally, and how about in our neck of the woods, specifically, the Overlook neighborhood?

According to RMLS statistics, in 2008, a total of 55 homes sold (detached single family, attached, and condominium homes). The average sold home was: 2146 square feet, sold for \$347,168 (\$162 s/f) with an average market time of 47 days before sale pending. The median home (half sold for more, half sold for less) was \$334,000 with a median square foot of 2250 and a median market time of 29 days.

By comparison, in 2009, a total of 32 homes sold. The average home sold was 2147 square feet, sold for \$326,011 (\$152 s/f) with an average of 42 days) on the market. The median home sold for \$324,000 with a median of 22 days on the market before sale pending.

Let's take a few items into account before we get too worried. A positive note: days on the market are down year over year. The median home price in Portland is down, but the data is somewhat skewed by the fact that mostly lower priced homes are selling; primarily due to the first time homebuyer tax credit. There are fewer single family homes in the Overlook neighborhood in the \$250K price range than the rest of North Portland in as a whole. There were a total of 670 homes sold in North Portland with the median sales price being

What are the long term housing trends? According to local economist Jerry Johnson of Johnson-Reid, LLC, the overall home appreciation rates for the Portland Metro area are: 20 years: 6%, 10 year 4%, 5 year: 3%.

\$230K.

The average length of ownership in Overlook is 7.5 years; most homeowners here have positive appreciation. For those who already own a home, the low interest rates make this an excellent time to refinance It is also a great time to "trade up" to a more expensive home with the new \$6500 move up/repeat homebuyer tax credit. Renters may want to take advantage of the extended first time home buyer credit of \$8000. For more info, go www.federalhousingtaxcredit.com

## What's Going On at the Rose Quarter?

There has been a lot of talk lately about the redevelopment of the Rose Quarter and the Memorial Coliseum. Ideas have included a Beavers baseball stadium, the Jumptown Entertainment District, the Memorial Athletic and Recreation Center (the MARC) and many others.

If you've been trying to follow the process, then you know it's a bit confusing, but whatever happens there will have an impact on our neighborhood. Overlook residents need to pay close atten-

Here's what we know: the Mayor has formed the Rose Quarter Stakeholder Advisory Committee to solicit input on the redevelopment and to review and evaluate proposals. On Jan 25th, proposals from several dozen teams were presented at Memorial Coliseum. You can read more about this committee and the proposals that were submitted at www.rosequarterdevelopment.com

From that web site:

"Future Rose Quarter development will realize the

long-anticipated community vision of a pedestrian-oriented, mixed-use district that showcases leading edge sustainability practices, creates jobs, and is well integrated and connected with the surrounding neighborhood and adjacent Lloyd district. This twelve-



month project process will result in the creation of a Rose Quarter Development Strategy and a determination on the future of Memorial Coliseum."

That sounds great but how will it be funded? Good question. Most proposals are not clear about how they will be financed or even how much they will cost, but it is a good bet that some of the funding will come from the Interstate Corridor Urban Renewal Area (ICURA).

While the Rose Quarter is in the Oregon Convention Center (OCC) Urban Renewal area, not the ICURA, the tax-increment financing capacity of the OCCURA is just about tapped out. In other words, they're out of money.

To resolve this dilemma, PDC has formed a new committee to evaluate and make recommendations on redrawing the Interstate Corridor URA boundries. This committee, known as the N/NE Economic Development Committee, is expected to recommend that the Rose Quarter be included in the ICURA, thereby allowing ICURA funds to be used for the Rose Quarter Redevelopment.

Do you have a project that you are working on – or maybe just thinking about? If so, the North Portland Tool Library (NPTL) may be able to


help you in starting and/or finishing it in an affordable way. Portland's first tool library, started in 2004, operates on a combination of grant funding and private donations while giving North Portlanders the ability to "borrow" tools for free. With over 500 tools in its collection, from power to hand tools, the library affords an option to buying a tool or paying a contractor: a free week-long rental.

The volunteer (non-paid) board of directors works to fulfill the organization's primary objective to "help

build community and livability in this very diverse area of the city." They are trying to provide Overlook, and other North Portland residents, with a great resource for DIY projects, from raised bed gardens to weatherizing your home. While you may still need to buy materials from a hardware store - or the Rebuilding Center, as a cheaper, more sustainable option (www.rebuildingcenter.org) – you could be able to save some money while being part of a "community resource" that serves those of us who call North Portland home.

In addition to the catalogue of tools for borrowing, NPTL offers some useful low-cost lessons pertaining to home and garden projects. In February, the library offers advice on building

> planter boxes and each summer (before fall) they offer an annual rain barrel lesson for those interested in harvesting some of Portland's precipitation. NPTL is also open to suggestions about possible topics that you are interested in, so please let them know if you have a great idea brewing.




The hard copy of "Historic North/Northeast Portland Today" has a guide to the 14 thriving business districts in


### Bluff Light Post Project Beams

The Willamette Bluff Light Post project is well underway. Fifteen old wooden street light poles and overhead wires have been removed, new wires have been buried underground, fifteen new poles have been installed and when the sun goes down at night the new lights shine brightly on North Willamette Boulevard.

The next phase of the project, a demonstration study to evaluate energy-efficient street light technologies, is presently being performed by the Bureau of Transportation, the Bureau of Planning and Sustainability, U.S. Department of Energy, Pacific Northwest National Laboratory, Energy Trust of Oregon, and several street light manufacturers. The study compares the three different street light technologies installed; five High-pressure Sodium (the same lights the city of Portland has been using since the 1980's), five newer moreefficient Induction, and five LED. The neighborhood will soon be asked for their feedback regarding light levels, light color, and other aspects of the light quality.

Once the demonstration study has been completed, the final step is to choose one light fixture and light type and install this selection on each of the fifteen light poles. The Induction lights set in the Architectural Area Lighting (AAL) Universe Collection fixtures are extremely energy efficient, aesthetically pleasing, and the most expensive.

To complete the project

with these fixtures, the project will require an additional \$12,500. (The AAL Universe Collection fixtures are installed on the five southern-most light poles, starting at the corner of N Killingsworth and N Willamette. See accompanying map.). Although there are two neighborhood grant programs we will be applying for, if any members of the community would like to donate to this effort, please note that it is a 501-3c tax deduction.


