

Cynthia Sulaski also gave us a report of her luncheon with the Union Pacific Railroad executives, who visited Portland on their historic steam train #844.

Elections to the board were conducted on a slate again this year. All interested people put their names on the ballot for the 16 positions. The board will decide chair responsibilities among themselves at the October board meeting.

Operation Paperback: Recycled Reading For Our Troops

Many of us disagree about the validity of the United States' participation in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, both conflicts having split our nation asunder during the past

seven years. In different ways, the chasm has been cause for concern for those of us on all sides of the political spectrum. However, contrary to this pugnacious taking of sides, there has been almost uni-

versal American approval and support for our troops whose lives are always at stake. (For a stunning account, see the new Sebastian Junger book, "War." This is a real eyeopener, no matter where one stands politically.)

As an expression of lending support to our troops I have become an official volunteer with a non-partisan organization called, "Operation Paperback." It is run by a grass roots group of volunteers whose current

primary mission is to send gently used books to our troops in the Middle East. OP has been doing this good work for the past ten years and with the help of thousands of volunteers like me, has shipped over a million books overseas. I have already sent several cases of books to individuals per their requests which I obtained from OP. In addition, I am in the process of rounding up several hundred books destined for three libraries being set up for military personnel who just recently

arrived at their bases in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Unfortunately, I don't have an endless supply of books in my own library to meet all of the troops' needs and am asking you, my Overlook neighbors, for your help in providing books and/or donating cash to cover the considerable cost of postage.

If you would like to help, please send an email to me with "Operation Paperback" as the subject line. Provide your telephone number, approximate quantity of gently used books and the names of the three largest genres* you will be contributing. If you have questions, let's use email as a means of talking for now. Eventually, depending upon the response I get from the neighborhood, I will give you a call to work out details and answer any addi-



tional questions. The cost for shipping books runs from thirty to sixty cents each, even at the lowest possible media mail rate. I would love to be able to cover the cost of postage, but Midas I'm not. If you would like to donate for this purpose, let me know. Your contributions will be tax deductible.

What I will do: after receiving and sorting your gifts of gently

used books, I will obtain a list of individuals and units requesting books, pack them according to genre preference of the recipient(s), label each book as part of Operation Paperback, fill in customs forms (yes, even to APO's) and then make a beeline to the post office. I really felt gratified on my first trip to the post office with a carton of books destined for one of our troops.

So this is my pitch for a really good cause. I hope

you can help me in this effort to support our men and women who are much at risk in service to our coun-








"Soupstainability" New Overlook Group

Well, I'm now totally legal! I'd thought I had my bases covered when I talked to the two neighbors I share a property line with and got their enthusiastic responses to my desire to keep bees. But lo and behold, a letter arrived from the county Health Department reporting that a complaint had been made concerning my hive. As it turns out, a permit is required to keep bees in Multnomah County (who knew?!), and the application requires getting all the neighbors within 150 feet of the hive to 'sign off' on it. Well. Off I went to my immediate neighbors ("I haven't noticed more bees around than before...") and then ventured up the front steps of neighbors a bit farther up the block. It was great to meet them, and I'm happy to say that everyone supported my apiary ambitions: I now have my very own "Specified Animal Facility Permit" for the keeping of bees. Always good to stay on the right side of the law!

Overlook Park Updates

Overlook Park was well served by Portland Parks & Recreation Rangers this summer. The ranger teams made 90 visits to Overlook Park and spent over 70 hours responding to calls for service, educating park users, rendering assistance and removing camps in the park. During the winter months the numbers of ranger teams are reduced and their availability is limited since they are covering all parks and natural areas throughout the City of Portland. General ranger assistance can be provided by contacting the PP&R ranger headquarters at 503-823-1637. If you see unlawful activity, please call the Portland Police Bureau's non-emergency number (503-823-3333) for assistance.

This fall, the Bureau of Environmental Ser-

vices will be contracting out sewer line repairs at Overlook The Park.



sewer line was damaged by a root ball and has been repaired with a temporary fix. The more permanent solution will require excavation to install a new line slipped inside of the existing sewer line. The estimated construction time line will be in November. During that time period, the off-leash dog area will be **relocated** to the northwest corner of the park. Portland Parks will post signs two weeks in advance of the construction and fencing will block off the two excavation sites during the repair.

Portland Parks and Recreation was required to decommission all wading pools citywide due to new state health regulations. The current budget environment does not allow for the deconstruction of the existing wading pool structures. A study was completed to analyze wading pool replacements with interactive splash pads. ICURAC funding has brought several splash pads to North and Northeast Portland; Columbia Park, Kenton Park, Northgate Park, and Peninsula Park. The next splash pad will be constructed at Farragut Park. Portland Parks and the ICURAC Parks Committee will be exploring options for replacing the wading pool at Overlook Park. The next priority for a splash pad is in St Johns where there is an active summer and free lunch program.

Its Time to Order Trees!

Hey Everyone! If you want to purchase heavily discounted trees for your yard or your sidewalk planting strip, the deadline for signing up is **December 20th**. Registrations are rolling in and it looks like record numbers of Portland residents have already signed up; they must be on to something! Actually they are — the website www.FriendsOfTrees.org. As outlined in the last edition of Overlook Views, here is a breakdown of what you would do to order

- 1. Walk around your property, and think about where you might like to have a tree.
- 2. Visit the Friends of Trees website and register. (https://friendsoftrees.org/order-streetand-yard-trees). You don't actually buy them until weeks later so you haven't committed to anything yet.
- 3. After getting the results of your inspection from the Portland Urban Forestry Division (Friends of Trees takes care of the entire permitting process), go back to the website and purchase your steeply discounted tree(s). There is a secure ordering form and pricing guide.
- 4. Help plant your tree and your neighbors' trees on January 29th at our event, or help out in one of many other great ways...

Every year dozens of Overlook residents come out to plant the trees at our event, and some more come out to help out in



other essential ways. This year is no different, so anybody who wants to use their pickup trucks to haul trees and anybody who wants to show off their awesome cooking skills to hungry volunteers should definitely contact us about volunteering on January 29th.

Local Nonprofit Gives Free Healthy Home Check-Ups!

While most of us have heard of the environmental movement to keep our skies blue and our water clear, you may not have heard of those fighting to keep our indoor environment clean. The Josiah Hill III Clinic (JHC) wants to make sure your home is healthy place to live. Americans spend approximately 90% of their time indoors where the air is 2-5 times more polluted than the air we breathe in the great outdoors. Everyday cleaning supplies can be surprisingly toxic, harmlessseeming mold and mildew can trigger asthma and allergies, and the invisible presence of lead can severely affect the development of children.

Thanks to funding from the Environmental Protection Agency, JHC now offers free Healthy Home Check-Ups to North and Northeast Portland families with small children. During the one-hour Healthy Home Check-Up, a friendly volunteer or

staff member will visit your home and assesses potential hazards, such asthma, allergy, and migraine triggers; lead exposure from paint and other sources; mold and mildew; and toxic chemicals linked to adverse health outcomes. Once hazards are identified, JHC provides consultation on exposure elimination and provides helpful resources and household supplies to assist you in improving the health of your home.



PSU Students Practice Building "Bottle Houses" in Overlook recycling puts trash to work

Overlook resident Alan DeLaTorre is an instructor for a Portland State University study-abroad program that takes between 10-15 students to Nicaragua each year to work with communities to improve the lives of older adults. The program, which has been ongoing since 2004, works with both undergraduate and graduate students on projects that focus on public health, community development, and other aging-related disciplines. One of the project teams for the 2010 program focused their efforts on constructing a small home for an older woman; her previous home had burned down, and the woman was living in a makeshift shelter constructed of tree branches and plastic sheeting.

The replacement home was to use traditional Nicaraguan building practices – a concrete and reinforced steel foundation, along with a galvanized steel roof – to create a skeleton that would then have walls constructed from 1.5 liter plastic bottles filled with dry, inorganic garbage. Poultry wire would encase the bottles, and then coats of cement were to be applied as the final layer for the walls. The students gathered in Overlook to practice building a model house

- which will is now being used as a shed by the instructor - which prepared them for the actual work in Nicaragua which took place in late June.

Ultimately, the bottle house was estimated to have cost more than a home constructed using traditional building techniques. Nonetheless, several important outcomes were noted. First, the community in Nicaragua was surprised

by the proposed materials for the house, as using recycled materials, including garbage, had not been considered a viable means for building a house. Thus, valuable education regarding environmental stewardship and recycling and reuse was provided. Second, the involvement of community members in the project was viewed as a great success. People of all ages participated. The effort seemed to create a new energy in the community,

and a desire for similar future projects has been expressed. Miles away from the project site, students and faculty were peppered by questions from peo-

Ride Connection's Ride Together Program

Transportation for Elders Includes Options

Ride Connection is seen as the center of the wheel that moves throughout our communities, offering essential



transportation in a coordinated, collaborative, stable and reliable manner, keeping older adults and people with disabilities independent and mobile.

Ride Connection is recruiting volunteer drivers to serve in your neighborhood and beyond. The volunteer driver's role is to provide necessary transportation services to older adults and people with disabilities in the tricounty area who are unable to drive and access public transportation for various needs, often for life-sustaining purposes. Volunteer drivers provide transportation in a Ride Connection vehicle or in their own personal vehicle to medical/dental appointments, shopping, volunteering and other personal business. This service enables these individuals to continue to live independent, quality lives. Last year over 370,000 rides were provided to customers through Ride Connection and its partner agencies.

The Ride Together program was developed under the auspicious of Ride Connection. It is designed to empower potential riders by having them recruit their own volunteer drivers. The drivers may be reimbursed for the costs incurred for mileage. Drivers will go through the Ride Connection approval process before they will be qualified for mileage reimbursement. They must also take classes pertaining to driving. This service is available to older adults and people with disabilities within Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties.

Those individuals who have an interest in becoming a customer (rider) through this program may learn more by calling the Ride Connection Service Center at 503.226.0700. Customers are to refer their volunteer driver to Ride Connection by first giving them a driver packet. Drivers may include friends, neighbors, church members, or organizational volunteers who have driven for five years or more. 

Overlook Residents Step Up for **Beach School Safety**

In late September, I had the privilege of meeting and working with a dedicated group of Overlook residents, Beach school parents, and concerned citizens to start a Community Foot Patrol to focus on keeping Beach Elementary School safe and clean.

Beach has seen its fair share of graffiti and vandalism and occasional criminal activity and these residents contacted me to see what we could do. As of the writing of this article, a group of about 10 neighbors have been trained and will be participating in a Foot Patrol. Like your standard Neighborhood Watch, this group went through formal training and will be working closely with our North Precinct Police Officers, Crime Prevention, and Beach School staff to regularly patrol the school groups at various times and days of the week and help keep an extra set of eyes on the school and it's property.

Foot Patrol members are 100 percent Non-Confrontational and never put their safety in jeopardy. The Foot Patrol contacts the Police Precinct prior to every Patrol letting our Overlook patrol Officers know they are out and about. If and when suspicious activity is observed, they call the police or make the appropriate reports after their Patrol. Members wear clear, identifying clothing allowing responding Police to easily recognize them and also provide a visual deterrent to criminal elements in the area that trained neighbors are looking out for their community.

The Beach School Foot Patrol will initially focus on the school, but as time and hopefully the number of members grow, they may expand their Patrol area to include more areas in Overlook. Please contact me if you have any interest in joining this Foot Patrol or starting one of your own. A HUGE thank you to all the members who attending our initial training and to Beach School for their partnership in this project. We're hopeful this volunteer group will reduce crime in the area and keep Beach the safe and vibrant school it is.

Last of the Summer Wine?

Summer brings abundance to our tables. Enterprising households use canning to preserve a taste of summer for the colder months. Little did I know a favorite taste of fall can be preserved in summer too.

June before last, a man knocked on my door and asked if he could have some walnuts from my tree. I was confused, since they don't ripen until October. Then he explained he needed green walnuts to make a French liqueur called vin de noix. And, that he'd give me a bottle. I readily agreed! Some months later he delivered an ambrosia made using red wine, green walnuts, neutral spirits, spices, and sugar. It resembled a marriage of tawny port and essence of walnut, and was very popular at my holiday

Fast forward to early this July, when three friends and I picked walnuts from the tree and gathered on my patio to make walnut liqueur. This was my second year making it, and they all wanted in after tasting some last winter. I had made three batches of vin

de noix, each from a different recipe — but also an Italian liqueur called nocino, which dispenses with the wine. They adored the nocino, and that's what they were here to make.

So we quartered the green walnuts, still in their husks, and mixed them with vodka or grain alcohol. Throw in a vanilla bean, some cloves, some cinnamon stick. Maybe some fresh citrus zest. Maybe some star anise. No two recipes agree on which spices or how much, but it is hard to go wrong.

Then you wait a month or more, agitating the jars from time to time. Eventually, you strain

out the liquid from the solids and add sugar before bottling and aging the liqueur. It starts out bitter, and takes on an almost black color from the compounds in the walnuts that stain your fingers (and can used to stain



wood). Over time, the bitterness mellows and the flavors mix into something extraordinary. If you want to make your own, search the internet for recipes. The pity is you'll have to wait until next June or July though, because now the shells on the nuts have hardinside husks. ened t h e

Back to my patio, we admired our assembled jars of this year's vin de noix and nocino while sipping some of last year's. I brought out walnuts from fall's harvest, and as we talked and cracked the nuts, we compared the perfection of the nut in its pure form to the perfection of the nut transformed and elevated in spirits.


