

OKNA Board Elections in September





Overlook's Heritage Trees: plant your own personal legacy

Portland City Code contains an ordinance which allows trees that have been approved by City Council to be designated as **Heritage Trees**. In addition to trees that are old or especially large, a tree that is a unique specimen or has an historical interest may

make it onto the Heritage list. Once designated, it is unlawful for a Heritage Tree to be removed or injured. The trees can be in public spaces, like right-of-ways or parks, or also on private land if it is visible from the sidewalk. Currently the City has nearly 300 Heritage Trees, representing over 100 species. Ten of these are in Overlook, and all are worth a look as you walk through the neighborhood.

Each tree will have a plaque which identifies the species and the year it became a Heritage Tree. (*Thanks, Matt Scoggin, for getting us a photo of one!*)


There are many species of oak trees but the Scarlet Oak (#259 on the map) is uncommon in the Portland area. The one at 3922 N Overlook Blvd is over 100' tall with scarlet foliage in the fall. Another tree, which is considered very rare in Portland, is the Gray (Digger) Pine (#239). There is one in our neighborhood on N Mason near the corner of N Massachusetts. Watch out for the spiky cones that can weigh up to 5 lbs! The first designated Overlook Heritage tree is an Oregon White Oak (#19), at 1815 N Humboldt; it could be one of the largest in the city at over 80' tall. There is a beautiful Northern Red Oak toward the back of Patton Park on N Interstate Avenue at N Maryland (it's not detailed on the map). During the recent heritage tree inspections, this one was the largest of the Heritage Trees in Overlook. It is huge; the trunk measured 16'8' in circumference and the canopy spread was 105'.

If you have a yard tree that you are particularly proud of, or have a favorite tree in the neighborhood, consider nominating it for heritage status. If accepted, you get the bragging rights! The



form can be found on www.portlandparks.org. Nomination deadlines are August 31st and May 31st.

Where will the City's heritage trees come from 50 years from now? Regulations on the size and type of trees that can be planted in the right-of-ways are stricter now than when our houses were built. As our older street trees die off, they may not be able to be replaced with similarly large trees. On your property though, you can plant any species. Are you new to the neighborhood, or have a birth to celebrate? Consider planting a tree to commemorate a special event. Pass the tree's history onto your kids. You may be the one planting a future Heritage Tree for Overlook.

My Life With Bees — The Adventure Begins

This spring I decided to 'keep' bees. I'd been hearing through local permaculture friends about the trouble honeybees are having, and of their importance in pollinating our food crops. I signed up for "Bees – The Other Way", a class held in October on a farm in Battle Ground, WA. The instructor teaches what she calls **natural beekeeping**, which focuses on the health of the hive rather than honey production. I loved the class and her approach, so I decided to take the plunge. I got the name of a hive builder in Hillsboro, and I placed an order for a Warre hive.

My hive arrived in March, and later that month I traveled back to Battle Ground for another class – this time covering swarm capture, installing a swarm in a hive, good hive sites and good nectar plants for honeybees. Now I was ready to get a wild swarm for my hive.

In early May, I got an email saying there was a swarm that I could have – if I could be ready – that night! At 7pm the '**swarm wrangler**' arrived with an air-vented card-

board box that was somewhat heavy and emitting a low hum. She and I suited up in hats, veils and gloves and brought the box to the back yard where I'd set up the hive. opened the hive, the wrangler unsealed the box and then, in a 'tornado' of mellow, honeydrunk bees, we shook and tapped

and brushed – by her estimate – around 20,000 honeybees into the hive. I closed up the hive, we brushed each other off, and left them to get acquainted with their new home.

The next day all the stragglers had found their way into the hive and worker bees were exploring the flowering plants around the neighborhood. Did you know a honeybee will travel 2 miles or more to a nectar source? The bees have settled in and have been busy in the month+ since they arrived. If you see a honeybee in your blossoms, it just might be one of 'mine'!

My hope is to provide good habitat for the bees, and in turn reap the benefits of their pollinating work. I think I'll wait until next spring to take a bit of honey, if there is some that they haven't needed for food during the winter. Imagine – Overlook Honey! I'd like to ask all my neighbors in Overlook to help me – and your gardens! – by not using chemicals that might harm them. I'll do my best on my end to see to their health.

PS: If you saw the front-page article in the Oregonian on July 13th (use this tinyURL: http:// tinyurl.com/367jlwq), you know about the mites and other environmental challenges that are contributing to what is called Colony Collapse Disorder, a mysterious dying off of honeybee populations that is of grave concern to our farmers and orchardists. I hope you'll join my efforts to keep our neighborhood bees healthy – it will benefit us, too!

It's time to think about where you want trees planted and how you can help plant them. Our neighborhood's planting event is **January 29th**, but there is plenty to do

in the meantime. If you want to take advantage of the super generous tree discounts offered through Friends of Trees, the deadline for signing up is **December 20th** (discounts apply to trees for your private yard too). You could wait until then, or **you could start now** and buy a tree while the kind that you want is still in supply. So far, record numbers of people have already begun the process. Here is a breakdown of what you will do to order trees and participate in the event:

1. Walk around your property, and think about where you might like to have a tree.

2. Visit the Friends of Trees website and register. (https://friendsoftrees.org/order-street-and-yard-trees).

3. After getting the results of your inspection from the Portland Urban Forestry Division (Friends of Trees takes care of the entire permitting process), go back

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January 29th at our event, or help out in one of many other great ways.

If you want more information, if you have any questions, or if you don't want to use the internet, please call me at the number listed below.

Some of you already have as many trees as you want on your property, but there are many ways to help without actually planting trees. If you have a pickup truck, we need you to put it to work on planting day! If you enjoy preparing and serving food and hot drinks to hungry people who have been working outside, we need you too!

One more thing; actually a few more things. We want your help in making sure that your neighbors know about this awesome opportunity, so come out with us and talk to neighbors about how all of this works (or head out on your own after a very brief-briefing on how its done). Join Erika and I over the next few months coordinating all of the above. If one or more people join us, we can call ourselves the **"Overlook** **Neighborhood Tree Planting Committee.**" Very distinguished! Finally a **call to all renters** (I am a renter too). Tell your landlord that you will water any trees that they plant at your place, and then water those trees!



Our "Know Your Neighborhood" Meeting

We had often thought it would be nice to pull neighbors together and get to know each other better. With a frustrating increase in crime in our neighborhood lately and realizing how important it is for communities to be prepared for natural disasters, I felt motivated to make it happen.

I was inspired by my late Uncle David, who built his home with his own hands in 1951 and watched it burn to the ground in the 1991 Oakland fires. You never think it will happen to you. But in 1991 a small brush fire grew to a blaze that destroyed hundreds of homes in his neighborhood. Standing on his property all you could see in any direction was ash and chimneys. He dealt with his loss by rebuilding on the same property. Then he proceeded to inspire his neighborhood to organize so to be better prepared as a community to survive a natural disaster and to prevent crime. They collectively were able to strengthen ties between their neighborhood and city agencies, police and fire; to gain fire and crime prevention training; to request as a group additional street lights and fire hydrants.



Finally I decided to research ways to organize as neighbors and was especially pleased to learn the City of Portland has its own 'Know Your Neighborhood' program in place. Many of you may have enjoyed the article in the spring edition of our own Overlook Views about the KYN program and may have attended the presentation that was held at the Overlook House this past spring. If you search 'know your neighborhood Portland Oregon' you will find the website complete with a description of the program and contact information so you can plan your presentation for your block.

Led by neighbors on N Concord Ave. who held

a KYN meeting in June, there have now been meetings for our block of Overlook Blvd., the block behind us on Overlook Terr. and a block on Castle Ave. It seems neighbors are excited to take advantage of this special program.

For our experience we mentioned the idea to neighbors Mark Sotta, John Klosterman and Elaine Mann, who jumped in to help coordinate the event. John provided childcare at his home. Elaine offered to host our event at her home. All helped with ideas for the evening, invitations and snacks. We created our own contact list for those who wished to share information with neighbors (much easier than trying to collect all the information at the meeting). We identified a person to create an email survey for neighbors who choose to be on a contact list and share information relevant to being supported in the case of a natural disaster. This information will also allow us to share in order to prevent crime and vandalism. There is the option to include special skills or tools you would be able to share in an emergency as well as special needs.

Contacting the city to request our presentation was simple. You can contact the KYN coordi-Stephanie Reynolds at: Stephanator nie.Reynolds@portlandoregon.gov to request your presentation. She will guide you from there.

We created invitations and passed them door to door several weeks before our date. Once a date is established a trainer will be assigned to you. In our case we thank our wonderful trainers Gayle Vrla and Edgar Rodriguez.

I am pleased to say we had good response and enjoyed meeting each other, listening to the presentation and learning how we can share information and plan to support each other. The presentation informs us all of other programs and trainings we can choose to experience including opportunities to volunteer.

We are following up by contacting all the neighbors who were unable to attend, providing them with booklets and the option to share their information.


I like the way this program offers a structure and ideas for organizing as neighbors while supporting that we can choose as a group and as individuals to create our own plan of action and participate as we are each comfortable.

In the end, we are all closer as neighbors and one big step closer toward being more prepared to deal with a disaster and support each other in general. It was a very good experience!

You may recall my bold proclamation, made public here in Overlook Views on purpose, to organize a KYN meeting for our block. I did this publically so I would be accountable to my loyal readers, and they took me up on it! My neighbor Mary came and found me so she'd be sure to not miss the meeting. Since I had, to that time, procrastinated, I quickly deputized Mary to help me make it happen, and we did.. quickly, too! We were already ahead of the game; we had a map of who lives in which house, and phone and email contacts; choosing a date was the hardest part.

Gayle and Edgar also conducted our KYN meeting; they are citizen volunteers who I thank again for sharing their evenings with us. What pleased me the most is our outcome. I felt the burden was on me, as organizer, to do the followup, however, spreadsheet whiz Alan is collecting our data in one place and brand-new neighbor Josh is plotting our homes for water & gas shut-off maps. We'll have more to share after our block party when we put all the data together and show off our 72-hour supply kits!



UPS Opening New Facility

UPS announced in July it is opening a large,

Nancy Koeper, president, UPS Northwest District. "We see significant growth potential in this part of the country and this facility positions UPS to provide the

best of service for years into the future."

The facility at 6707 N Basin Ave is an expansion of the old building, which was built in 1971. The new building covers 263,488 square feet; can accommodate up to 265 delivery trucks, and can sort up to 40,000 packages per hour. The old building could service up to 204 trucks and was able to sort half as many packages as the new structure. The new facility also features a modern customer counter inside to handle any shipping need. An automated "tilt tray" sorting process has been added for the sortation of small packages. Other enhancements include technology upgrades that will decrease the effort needed to sort packages and improve sorting accuracy resulting in reduced fuel consumption, miles driven and carbon emissions. UPS's proprietary routing technology has helped the company avoid driving 119,000,000 miles since 2001. This facility further features a Bio Swale waste water recycling system, super energy efficient lighting fixtures, above-ground fuel tanks and increased recycling capability for solid waste.



Metro Helps Portland Get RID of Junk Regional Illegal Dumping Patrol

At the July OKNA General meeting, Tiffany Gates from Metro's RID Patrol came by to tell us how to combat illegal dumping. Interestingly enough, we'd received an inquiry on the O K N A h o t l i n e (info@OverlookNeighborhood.org) regarding some illegally dumped concrete wastage, so it seems like a good time to share this with the rest of OKNA.

Metro's RID Patrol tackles the problem of illegal dumping in multiple ways: cleaning up dump sites, investigating evidence found at the dump sites, issuing citations to the guilty parties, investigating haulers that are illegally dumping and working with law enforcement agencies and communities that need education and help to reduce dumping in their neighborhood.

But, they count on your help; Alert the RID Patrol! If you see anyone dumping illegally, write down a vehicle license plate number and other identifying information. You can report online or by calling Metro Recycling Information at 503-234-3000.

Tiffany reminded us of what her team knows: If you leave it, the situation will get worse. Garbage seems to attract garbage. Illegal dumps diminish the quality of life and livability of the neighborhood. Illegal dumping of trash, garbage, discarded appliances, old barrels, used tires, furniture, yard debris, oil, antifreeze and pesticides can threaten human health, wildlife and the environment. Dumps can pollute local waterways and groundwater or cause injury to children or pets playing in or around the dumps. Tires become breeding grounds for mosquitoes and other noxious insects. Some dumps have become home to rodents. Illegal dumps depress the value of surrounding land. That could be your property value affected.

Beware of "freelance" haulers

You could become the victim of con artists who dump your trash illegally. The result could be an environmental eyesore and even a citation and fine for the resident who was only trying to save a few dollars. Contact your regular garbage hauler about removing large or unusual items, or give Metro a call for a referral.

Metro works closely with other local government agencies and local law enforcement to assure that illegal dumps are quickly and thoroughly cleaned up and investigated. Metro handles illegal dump cleanup services on publicly owned land. Metro can assist private property owners with investigation of illegal dumps on private property.





Edible Roof Garden Takes Root

At Trillium Charter School an edible rooftop garden is the grounds for garden-based education and public-private partnership. Edible Skylines, LLC was responsible for installation and worked with PSU, PCC and Trillium students in an educational capacity to build the raised beds and install the edible green roof. Trillium students were able to put in their first round of seeds and starts at the end of the school year and are looking forward to coming back to harvest lots of tomatoes, lettuce, peppers and more!

Trillium students utilize the rooftop garden to learn about where food comes from, how to seed, transplant, create planting plans, or-

> ganic fertilizers, storm water management and how to incorporate what they are growing into weekly cooking lessons. Produce from the student garden will be used in the school lunch program aiding students to see the food cycle come full circle, learn about supporting the local food economy and gain access to more healthy, nutritious and culturally appropriate foods.

> Edible Skylines manages the edible green roof and is selling vegetables and micro greens to local restaurants and Trillium families. Edible Skylines is donating 20% of profits back to the school to support the school's garden

> fund. Students benefit from a democratic learning style in which each stu-

dent's choices are valued and reflected in the work they are performing in the garden.

At Trillium, students take part in the larger picture of food security and storm water management by learning stewardship principals and taking ownership in the space the rooftop garden has created.


