Plastics & Corks Roundup! September 17th, 2011

Recycle Your Plastics and Corks at Kaiser West Interstate

In the last Overlook Views issue, we wrote about planning an event to make it easy for you to recycle



your plastics and wine corks but we couldn't give a definitive date or location. Now we can! Mark your calendars for Saturday, September 17, from 11 am to 3 pm at the parking lot of Kaiser's West Interstate building (across the street from Overlook Park).

Bring as much plastic as you want (only what's not recyclable at the curb). At the end of the day, we'll transport the items to the North Portland Recycling Center (Denver and Rosa Parks Blvd), a Far West Fibers site. We'll deliver the used wine corks to the New Seasons Market on Interstate, which collects them for Cork ReHarvest (www.corkforest.org) for ultimate reuse into various commercial products.

We hope to see you on **September 17**. We're planning a fun and informative community event. However, even if you can't join us then, know that you can recycle plastic items any time instead of tossing them into your garbage can for disposal in the land-fill. One neighbor has started doing just that and has been able to reduce her garbage amount by half a container every two months. We believe that many people could reduce their garbage collection amount to one container a month by removing recyclable plastics. Although it takes a little effort, the results are worth it. You can save money and be part of a solution instead of the problem. Think about getting together with your neighbors to share in this effort.

Here is a list of plastics that we will accept on September 17th. They can also be taken to Far West Fibers any day of the week. They must be grouped according to category:

- Bags (clean grocery, bread and garbage bags; bubble wrap; shrink wrap; and clean bags that contained soil or bark dust)
- Rigid Plastic (clean buckets, lids, plastic toys, PVC pipe 3 foot max, yogurt/cottage cheese containers, any hard plastic, CD's, VHS tapes + cases, cups, clamshells/deli trays, utensils/straws)
- Media plastic
- Bottles with necks

Bike Box Coming to N Interstate & Alberta

Heads up, neighbors. The Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) has scheduled safety upgrades that include bike box installations and crosswalk striping improvements through September.

A green Bike Box is coming to N Interstate at Alberta. The main goal of a bike box is to prevent collisions between motorists turning right and cyclists going straight. A temporary sign warning of the change has been posted at the intersection, but keep your eyes peeled for changes and watch out for your fellow commuters.

around 9:00 am. The bananas got cleaned out around 10:00 am, however the nectarines and bagels lasted until the very end, which was around 10:30 am.



"Small markets like ours are independent non-profits" reminds IFM Board Chair Marisa Bangs "and, for us, that means we do not break even with the stall fees we charge our vendors. Without another source of revenue - sponsorships and individual donations - our market is in jeopardy."

The volunteers who have steered the market through the 2011 season have some tough choices ahead of them. If a major sponsor isn't found soon, the market either shuts down permanently or may be handed-off to another operator, if there's any interest.

"It's not just a lack of revenue" notes Stefanie Snider, IFM Volunteer Coordinator, "we're in need of volunteers too. Many hands make the market run smoothly and keep it fun; too few hands burn out the committed volunteers."

IFM is currently searching for a Community Liaison to the Overlook Neighborhood. "An Overlook resident with a great neighborhood network would be very helpful as we begin deciding our future" says Marisa. "We need to hear from the local residents if they want this Farmers Market to remain operating on Wednesday nights at our Overlook site. We'll also need their time and energy to make that happen."

The IFM's mission is to provide a venue where local farmers can sell their produce directly to people that enjoy meeting the folks who grow their food. Other food-related vendors have been selected to join the market in recent years as well. 2011 was IFM's eighth season.






Overlook Tree Planting: It's Time to Order Trees!

Hey neighbors,

I hope your trees are healthy! It's that time of year again to buy street and yard trees for our winter neighborhood tree planting. Friends of Trees is offering trees for an amazingly low \$50 per tree for your front planting strip and your yard. If \$50 is too much, you can qualify for a discount by call-





It is really easy to sign up and buy trees. Visit the Friends of Trees website, https:// friendsoftrees.org/order-

street-and-yard-trees, and sign up. If you want trees for your yard, you can purchase them right away. If you want trees for next to the street, a tree specialist will come to your place to determine what kinds of trees fit well in the space next to the street. Then you can go back to the website and order the trees that you want. Then you are done ordering. We really hope to see you at the planting event this winter, when we plant all of the trees!

One of the reasons that these trees are so much cheaper than most trees, is that most people who order them actually volunteer to plant them with their neighbors. For example this past January, we had over 60 people from the neighborhood planting their own and each others trees. Many people who did not want to do the actual planting contributed in other ways, by making food for the planting event, or helping me out with organizing the event. The food was amazing and there was a lot of it. I'm betting we'll do just as well this year.

Now those trees are growing, and with the rest of

our neighborhood forest are lowering temperatures during extreme heat events. As the rainy season returns

they will continue providing benefits, as rain is slowed or evaporated on its path to the sewer, they will lessen the need for the city (all of us) to pay for expensive sewer upgrades. Meanwhile, our forest is cleaning impurities from the air, soaking up gases that cause climate change, providing valuable wildlife habitat, and giving our neighborhood a more natural feel.

I'm looking for others to join me in organizing the event, in making sure that everyone knows that they have an opportunity to purchase cheap trees for their front planting strip and yard, and in making sure everyone knows that they are welcome to join us on planting day to plant trees, meet neighbors, and share some great food. This is a great way to develop a strong sense of place, make connections in the community, develop some organizing experience and even improve your resume. Overlook Park Survey: We Need Your Input

Public safety has always been a priority concern for the Parks Subcommittee of the Interstate Corridor Urban Renewal Advisory Committee (ICURAC) in evaluating projects for funding. For instance, we agreed with the decision made by Portland Parks & Recreation (PP&R) to close its wading pools for health and safety reasons as required by new State of Oregon regulations. We also recommended the installation of splash pads, which spray water into the air, as a safe replacement for the wading pools. As a result, these new water play features were funded by PDC and installed in five parks located in the Interstate Corridor Urban Renewal Area (ICURA) - Columbia, Farragut, Kenton, Northgate and Peninsula Parks.

This year Overlook Park was the only remaining park in ICURA with a decommissioned wading





Garbage Collection Changes

On October 31, all Portland single-family households (and residents living in buildings with four or fewer units) will be able to place all food scraps (including meat and bones!), along with yard debris, in their green Portland Composts! roll carts. Composting food scraps reduces waste and creates nutrient-rich compost for fertilizing yards and gardens. Compost helps plants grow, prevents erosion, retains water, and blocks disease and weeds.

As part of the new Curbside Collection Service, the green Portland Composts! roll cart will increase to weekly pick up, and garbage collection will be changed to every-other-week, allowing additional food scrap and yard debris collection without raising prices for most residents. The blue roll cart and yellow glass recycling bin will continue to be collected every week.

To help you prepare for these changes, a kitchen pail and information packet will be delivered to your home with step-by-step instructions for composting food scraps in your green Portland Composts! roll cart. You will also receive information to help you select service that works for your household. Questions or comments?

pool awaiting a replacement splash pad. Unfortunately, PP&R determined that water usage for the new spray structures more than tripled, as did their water bills. Consequently, because of the high operations cost, PP&R decided not to install a water feature in Overlook Park.

However, the Parks Subcommittee, PDC and PP&R would like to fund one or more projects at Overlook Park instead of replacing the wading pool. So, I'm asking you to take a few minutes to complete an online survey (www.portlandonline.com/parks/index.cfm?&c=54712) to add your vote for which project to select. Suggestions include:

- Permeable path to replace wood chip path and to improve drainage
- Interior lighting
- Additional benches
 - Fitness trail with exercise stations
- Restroom improvements (new roof & gutters)
- Improved fencing along bluff

LEAF DAY MADE EASY

- ★ Earlier and better public notification through mailers meetings in leaf removal neighborhoods, Twitter announcements, and more.
- ★ Tweaked boundaries to provide the service where it's most needed.
- ★ Leaf fees implemented in 2010 still apply in 2011, and eligible customers may qualify for an exemption.
- ★ Simplified the leaf fee opt-out program and application process, included an online opt-out option, in addition to mail, fax, email, and inperson delivery. Deadline is in October.
- ★ The City will pick up yard leaves if you pile them in the street on leaf pickup day
- ★ Of course, if you opt out of the program, you may not rake your yard leaves into the street for leaf pickup service.

Podkrepa: A Bulgarian-Macedonian Organization

The beautiful Art Deco style stucco building at 2116 N Killingsworth doesn't give much away with its façade, Podkrepa Association 1939. Certainly there's no hint of the vintage fixtures inside, the specially made chairs and fittings, rescued from a Bulgarian display at an expo here.. it was cheaper to leave them behind then send them back to Bulgaria. Usually, there's no obvious hint of who uses the building.

Podkrepa was originally founded in 1939 to help Bulgarian and Macedonian immigrants in the Portland area adjust to their new country. In more recent years, the focus changed to uniting immigrants and their now-descendants to promote Bulgarian and Macedonian educational and cultural activities. The group is purely charitable; bylaws forbid political or religious endorsements or discussions. The important thing is keeping cultural traditions alive.

Monthly meetings are generally a little business followed by a potluck meal and dancing. Special events occur, depending on the interest and enthusiasm in the group at the time. This fall, a regular program of activities restarts including Balkan dancing, language and music classes for children, language classes for adults and cooking classes.

The Hall is occasionally rented out for other uses, but members are very protective of their haven, and screen renters carefully. Membership in the group is open to people of Bulgarian or Macedonian descent, but if you weren't born lucky, stop by some Saturday or Sunday afternoon. See it in person; it's beautiful!



Students from more than 5 different schools throughout North Portland provided the inspiration and creativity for Portland's newest public art mural. This past spring, students helped by providing ideas and also created a draft rendering of the themes and visuals which would cover a wall over 25' (width) x 30' (height) at Trillium Charter school. The mural displays the Children and Youth Bill of Rights. In 2006, Portland became the first city in the United States to create a bill of rights exclusively for youth. The "Our Bill of Rights: Children and Youth" was later adopted by Multnomah County.

The mural artists, Jesus García and Margret Harburg officially unveiled their completed project on September 1st. Since July 1st the artists have been working to bring the students ideas to life on a monumental scale. The ages of the youths who have participated range from 4 to 19; the young artists come from Blue Faith Youth, a faith based youth group from North Portland's Holy Cross Parish, as well as students from Trillium's 3rd and 4th grade art class.

In addition to the unveiling ceremony, an end of mural barbecue at Patton Square Park is scheduled for September 17th, 12pm-4pm; the event is free and open to all. More event information at: http://northportlandyouthmural.wordpress.com

Overlook History Sketches: Remembering My Friend

Our friend Art Brooks has a bench installed in his honor. It is located in that little grassy park at the end of Skidmore Terrace and overlooks the Portland harbor. If he were here he would think that tribute too much.

When first erected in 1981 it was a simple bench of cedar with crudely crafted hand lettering "Art Brooks Memorial Bench". Time has a hand with us all and a new, sturdier bench was raised in its place in 1987. And, so those who would rest upon it would know why it was placed there, the same simple inscription was engraved. Still later in `03 a grander bench was placed nearby to honor Arthur and another neighbor lovingly remembered.

Art came to live in our neighborhood in 1925. As a young man from Minnesota he worked in various automotive service stations in North Portland before establishing his own "Signal" brand station in 1935 at the corner of Interstate Ave. and Shaver

Brooks was beloved in our community.

Art lived on our street (Skidmore Terrace) for 45 years. I knew him as the quiet, gentle neighbor next door. Never blessed with formal education he was as bright and literate as any person I have ever met. Well read on any subject, historical or current, you could carry on a spirited conversation with Art on any matter except politics. I admired him tremendously and he was a wonderful mentor


Art's evening tradition was to enjoy an early supper and then come next door to our house and fall asleep on our living room sofa. His house was too

Prescription Drop Box Now At North Precinct

The Office of Neighborhood Involvement's Crime Prevention Program and the Portland Police Bureau have partnered to provide a total of three permanent prescription drug disposal boxes for the community. Central Precinct, North Precinct, and East Precinct each house a MedReturn Prescription Drug Drop box in the lobby, now available to the community during business hours. Simply bring in unused and expired medications and drop them in the box located in the precinct lobbies during lobby hours.

North Precinct 449 NE Emerson Street Portland, OR 97211 Lobby Hours 8:00am-6:00pm

Acceptable items for deposit: Prescription medications and samples, all over the counter medications, vitamins, pet medications, medicated ointments, and liquid medication in leak proof containers.

Items not acceptable for deposit: Thermometers/ Sharps/Syringes, IV bags, bloody or infectious waste, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans, inhalers, EpiPens.

Crime Prevention and the Police Bureau partner on a regular basis to hold prescription drug turn in events and will continue to do so. In the mean time, the prescription drug drop box will afford the community more opportunities to dispose of medications when needed.

The prescription drug drop box is one solution to the growing problem of teenagers gaining access to unused and expired medications in the medicine cabinets of their own homes, homes of friends and of grandparents. There is also a demand from the community to provide a safe disposal option for medications in an effort to protect our waterways.

quiet for a good nap while our home had just the right mix of blaring TV and noisy kids. And the man could out-snore anyone I have ever met. Nothing would wake him.

A simple bench is not honor enough for this gentle man who cut a large wedge out of so many lives in our little neighborhood. As a mechanic he was always there to serve. Battery jump, snow chain install, emergency repairs, all done from the green three wheeled Harley Davidson motorcycle "service vehicle" he used for nearly three decades.

Art died as he lived; helping a friend. He was walking into his best friend Holly Phipps' drugstore on North Mississippi when a thief grabbed a bank money bag Art was carrying for the druggist and ran. Art died of a heart attack while chasing the thief.

His funeral was moved from Friday to Saturday so more friends could attend. When the chapel was filled, chairs were set out on the lawn. And when those were filled more were set out in the parking lot. And when those were filled people stood and listened to the service on outdoor speakers.

That is a measure of how Art Brooks was beloved in our community.

Crime Prevention Update

Hello Overlook neighbors and businesses! I hope you all have been enjoying a fun and safe summer. I wanted to update you all on some locations and issues I've been working on in the Overlook area.

Going Overpass

As many of you probably know, the N Concord Avenue pe-

destrian bridge that runs over N Going Street has been a continual area for homeless camps and criminal activity. I continue to be contacted by neighbors and especially parents with concerns for the bridge's safety. I'm happy to report I conducted a security review of the entire bridge with Ross Swanson, project manager for the Neighborhood Greenway project in the Bureau of Transportation. He and I reviewed the safety concerns for this bridge and we are hopeful he will have enough money in his budget to at a minimum cut down the two trees that are obstructing the light, enhance the existing lighting, prune back the trees and limbs, and possibly add metal fencing on the south side to deter future camping in this area. There are still many details in the project to complete, but I'm hopeful we will see some substantial improvements to the security for this area.

Mocks Crest Park at The Parklet the end of Skidmore Ct and Terrace has recently received more coverage in both the Oregonian and even the New York Times, not to mention being named as the "Best Worst-Kept Secret" in Willamette Week. The Portland Police and Park Rangers continue to patrol this area to educate park users that alcohol is no longer permitted along with a host of park rules now in place starting this summer. I have received mixed reviews from neighbors and park users on this area and it is still a work in progress. Please call the police if you see people violating park rules such as drinking, using drugs, or urinating in the bushes etc.

Car Prowls

It's a constant theme in my updates, but to struggle with car

Overlook continues to struggle with car break-ins or car prowls as we call them. Both Overlook and Arbor Lodge were identified by the police last month as having a much higher car prowl rate than other North neighborhoods. I have spoken to many victims of this crime and almost without fail the victims are reporting valuable items in plain sight or their vehicle was left unlocked. If you park your car on the street and even in a driveway, please ensure your car is in "showroom clean" condition and locked. It can be a real inconvenience to do this every night. but it is really worth the time and effort. Also, if you are a victim of this or any crime please ensure you file a police report. Almost all of the crimes we are experiencing in Overlook qualify for on-line crime reporting at the Portland Police Bureau's website:

In the past several Transients months I have also been fielding multiple calls from frustrated residents and business owners regarding transients and homeless camps all around Overlook. This is a very complex issue the city of Portland is struggling with and there are sadly very few immediate answers or solutions. Some camps are simply individuals sleeping and not impacting anyone; however, the calls I'm receiving are including criminal activity ranging from open street drinking and intoxication, yelling and harassment of neighbors, to drug use and sales and vandalism and trespassing in vacant buildings. Please contact me if you see this type of activity or notice a new camp or area being used by a person you are concerned about. If you see someone obviously intoxicated or passed out, please call the police and they will respond and conduct what is essentially a welfare check.

At the request of Overlook residents, I will be facilitating what we hope will be a large community

forum to discuss many public safety topics and issues pertinent to the Overlook Neighborhood. The date of this forum is Wednesday, October 19th and it will be held at the Kaiser Town Hall Ballroom located at 3704 N. Interstate Ave. We will be sponsoring an open house from 6:00 pm-7:00 pm with many informa-

tion booths and representatives from the various public safety agencies that serve the Overlook area. The meeting will run from 7:00-9:00 pm with plenty of time for you to ask any questions or discuss safety issues.

The goal of the forum is to draw as many Overlook residents and business as possible (Town Hall seats 200 so help spread the word), and provide folks with the essential information on current crime and safety issues in and around Overlook, how to report crime and suspicious behavior, the importance of reporting crime, and how individuals can get involved with the many existing volun-

teer safety and livability teams and projects. Our very own Overlook Livability Team and Beach Foot Patrol will have information on how to join and just what their groups do in the neighborhood.

The meeting will have presentations from tentatively the Portland Police Bureau, The Mayor's Office, Portland Parks and Recreation Security, the Bureau of Emergency Communication (911 Center), Transit Police, Kaiser Permanente Security, and other organizations. You will have the opportunity to hear just what each agency does, their jurisdiction and resources, and how individual residents can communicate efficiently with each agency. Navigating the many different City and County public safety agencies can sometimes be confusing or frustrating, so the goal again is to provide attendees a solid knowledge base on how these different agencies function and how citizens

can actively participate and aid in increasing public safety. We want residents and businesses to know how to report everything from graffiti to crimes in progress and understand their roles and how to be a part of the public safety system.


