North Interstate in the Spotlight!

During the third week in April, Overlook suffered an invasion! Bulky lighting and sound equipment lined the north side of Overlook Boulevard at Interstate Avenue for part of the block, "kitchen trucks", generator trucks, outdoor potties (deluxe versions, made of metal no less) and several old style black and white police cars lined the blocks adjacent to and behind the Palms Motel. Two or three security guards patrolled the area; they'd tell you about their "brushes with fame" if you asked...

Actual work began at about 8:00 pm on April 18th when a crane device shone an actual spot light on the front of the Palms. On duty Portland Police briefly blocked N

Interstate Avenue by the Kaiser garages so a young lady (clad completely in black) could run across N Interstate from the Palms Police cars were driven through the side entrance of the Palms, lights flashing and actors gathered at the Palms night window to shoot a take. A canopy was set up over a buffet table on the park side of Overlook Blvd and hot food was served. Earlier, food had been served in the Polish Hall.

The work went on until after 1:00 am at least, but this writer returned home; hey, it was cold! The segment was shown a few nights later and MAYBE 90 seconds of the Palms exterior and N Interstate Avenue were shown! Regardless, our area has been immortalized again!

Joe Hamm, an Overlook Treasure

The Overlook neighborhood has so much going for it we sometimes forget the less obvious but very important assets: our fellow neighbors. Joe Hamm was one of those bedrock neighbors. Many generations of residents benefited from the joyful and free music lessons (fiddle, guitar, ukulele) Joe taught at the Overlook House and in his home. He was quick to offer a big warm smile and always ready for a jam session – including sessions at the Overlook House with his students and other neighbors. Although he read music he preferred to play by ear, and it was rare that anyone came-up with a song Joe didn't already know.

Joe's creativity was not limited to playing music – he was very accomplished with his hands. He built from scratch a very nice sounding violin he later used to record a CD. He fashioned the body and neck from a piece of maple found in his daughter's woodpile. The top (a particularly nice piece of fir) came from a shelf in the closet of his home. To create the fingerboard he reused furniture wood from a cruise ship being refitted into a WWII troop ship.

Joe was born in 1916 in Roy Montana, a small cow-town named after his brother Roy – the first baby born there. As a young boy Joe enjoyed the music of the waning cowboy days. When he was seven his sister's boyfriend, who played fiddle for country dances, taught Joe to play a few simple tunes – Joe was hooked. Hearing of this, an uncle gave him a violin he had; Joe later gave that violin to his daughter Peggy Jo who still plays it. In his teens Joe played for the Fort Benton and Kalispell high school orchestras.

The family moved to Portland in 1935, where Joe learned the machinist trade at Benson High and Oregon Institute of Technology. Joe worked for several shops in Portland and San Francisco before landing at Willamette Iron and Steel Company. He worked there until retiring as foreman of the tool-making department at the age of 62.

Joe and his wife Margaret were married for 60 years before her death. Together they raised five daughters in our neighborhood. They in turn gave them ten grand-

children and ten great-grandchildren – many who sing and play musical instruments.

After retiring, Joe began a new life (as he called it) when he brought music back into it. He found many great friends when he decided to pick-up that fiddle again. He once commented that "musicians are some of the nicest people you will meet." For about five years Joe played with two different


dance bands. He then joined the "Oregon Old Time Fiddlers Association," a group of musicians who jam, and play for dances and other events mostly at Senior Community Centers. Joe introduced some of his daughters and some of his students to OOTFA. Right up until the end, Joe enjoyed jamming with his daughters, his students, and his OOTFA friends.

On May 1st, at the age of 95, Joe died while still living in his long-time Overlook home. He is missed by all those who

knew him (and perhaps some who didn't). Joe left his piano to the Overlook House in the hope that it will help to continue the musical tradition he loved.

No-Parking Buildings Cause Concern Neighbors form committee, collaborate

Overlook residents were shocked by the announcement of plans to build a 65-unit apartment complex with no on-site parking right next to Overlook Park on N. Overlook Boulevard.

The OKNA board hastily called a special meeting

and on July 26, Barry Manning from Portland's Bureau of Planning and Sustainability provided zoning information, web links, and zoning code pertinent to the proposed Overlook Park apartment site.

His presentation, while informative, offered little hope to residents concerned about the proposed apartment building's impact on parking, safety, Overlook Park and the general character N Overlook Blvd, near N Interstate Avenue already has tight parking days. Photo: Gary Davenport


of the neighborhood. Resi-

dents around the block of 5118/5124 N. Interstate Avenue are facing similar issues, with a 45-unit apartment building slated to be built with no on-site parking, near Patton Square Park.

Mr. Manning did say that the Design Overlay assigned to the development site will provide an opportunity for residents to meet with the developer, but discussion is technically limited to the cosmetic appearance of the building and does not require the developer to discuss any parking issues, as the zoning at the location allows the building to be built with no parking spaces.

Also presenting was Dave Anderson from the Beaumont-Wilshire Neighborhood Association, representing Neighbors for Responsible Growth (NRG), a group of concerned residents from the Sellwood/ Moreland, Beaumont-Wilshire, Richmond, Overlook

> and Kerns neighborhoods who face similar construction concerns. During his presentation, Mr. Anderson laid out some of the details: A single developer, Wally Remmers of Everett Custom Homes and founder of Arbor Custom Homes, has purchased properties and drawn up plans for construction of high-density apart-



The city believes that in-fill apartment renters who have easy access to mass transit will chose to not own cars: however, we believe that most renters will keep their cars and will be forced to find parking in





the neighborhood, creating traffic congestion and safety problems. This is just the 'tip of the iceberg,' as under existing code, motels and other large holdings along the Interstate corridor may also be developed without any on-site parking —imagine what 200+ more cars trying to find parking on our neighborhood's streets will do to our quality of life.

Discussion of these and other concerns, followed by suggestions for solutions and actions filled the balance of the neighborhood meeting. Ideas ranged from engaging multiple agencies with an interest in Overlook Boulevard, including Portland Parks and Recreation, the Portland Fire Bureau and the Bureau of Transportation to encouraging the developer to build fewer but larger units to maximize the park views, perhaps as future condos. Ideas for using surplus off-hours parking in the area were also dis-

At the close of the meeting, participants agreed that a special OKNA subcommittee be quickly formed to focus on these issues. Gary Davenport was nominated and agreed to lead the subcommittee, which is currently working hard to ensure that Overlook residents have a voice about what high-density infill development will look like in North Portland. The subcommittee, calling itself Overlook Friends for Responsible Growth, will need your help and support. Interested residents should contact Gary Davenport at: onrg@comcast.net

The More Things Change, The More They Stay The Same **Neighborhood growth long-controversial**

2206 N. Skidmore Terrace. Ah-ha you say, no such address. But you would be wrong. That address is the first clue in a unlikely turn of events that concluded in December of 1979 but began nearly a decade earlier.

One day in the spring of (probably) 1970-1 dump trucks started rolling down tiny Skidmore Terrace at the rate of about 15 an hour. Fill dirt was being dumped into the wooded gully that forms the south side of that street. Shocked residents were watching the birth of a new housing development. The trucks would then gingerly make their way out for another load. Rumor had it that a realtor had purchased a half acre parcel in the gully at the 2206 address and was prepared to build three to four homes. As you might guess, the residents were not pleased and worried calls to the City of Portland were met with news "What the developer was doing is legal". What to do?

Now, Skidmore Terrace is a sub-standard street (narrow) and one of only two concave streets in Portland at the time. On-street parking would eat up at least half of that

meager width and certainly leave little room for large dump trucks to pass. On-street parking suddenly became fashionable on the street. This later escalated to alternating parking on both sides of the street as dump truck tires

carved into lawns trying to negotiate the narrow path. Police were summoned by both sides in what became a scalding conflict. City Bureaus were beleaguered with calls. Voices and tempers were raised.

Then quite suddenly, it all stopped. The gully was one third filled and remained that way until cooler heads and attorneys could sort it out.

One champion stepped up to battle the infill; resident Ken Slusher. With help, he battled the developer over the next few years until it became a standoff of strong wills. As far as the residents were concerned, they had won. To honor Ken's efforts they had the city Parks sign shop make up an official parks department sign reading Slusher Park which was presented to Ken at a celebration party in May, 1974. That sign stood on the

south gully for years before disappear-

The 2206 property was advertised for sale in the Oregonian newspaper during 1978, but there is no record of a buyer. On December 26, 1979 the attorney Ken had hired (resident Norman Lindstedt) put the case before the City Council for a final ruling to block the project. Records show the property passed into City hands in 1999 and is now with the Portland Parks Depart-

Still a resident of Overlook, Ken passed in on his 78th birthday in 1989.

Coal Trains: North Portland Neighbors Say No

On Tuesday, July 17th, residents of the Overlook neighborhood voted unanimously to



support a resolution calling for a full Environmental Impact Statement and Health Impact Analysis of all six export coal proposals across the Northwest before permits are issued for the construction of any terminal. Overlook is joined by the Chairs of all 11 North Portland neighborhood associations, Arbor Lodge, St. Johns, and the northeast neighborhood of Woodlawn in calling for these important assessments.

One of the speakers at the July 17th meeting was Dr. Andy Harris, a member of Oregon Physicians for Social Responsibility (ORSR). Dr. Harris spoke of the health impacts of coal dust and diesel emissions that would result from these proposals. Coal dust, according to Dr. Harris and OPSR, is linked to chronic bronchitis, emphysema, and pulmonary fibrosis. Coal dust also exposes air, water, and soil to heavy metals such as mercury and arsenic.

There are currently 6 proposals totaling over 150 million tons of coal export annually across the Northwest to ship US coal to Asia. Portland residents could see up to 8 full coal trains daily pass through neighborhoods en route to two proposed export projects: a 30 million ton terminal in St. Helens and a 10 million ton terminal in Coos Bay. A third project that impacts the region incorporates both rail and barge and would nearly double barge traffic on the Columbia River upriver of Bonneville Dam.

According to Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) Rail Company, "The amount of dust that escapes from trains is surprisingly large."

POWER PAST COAL communities against coal export

The rail company acknowledges that 500 pounds of coal can be lost in the form of dust from each rail car. Each 100-car train, therefore, could spill 50,000 pounds of coal dust into our rivers and towns.

Residents of the Overlook neighborhood can join OKNA in asking Governor John Kitzhaber to require the environmental and health impacts of these proposals before issuing state permits to construct coal export terminals and find out more about coal export by visiting the Power Past Coal website: www.PowerPastCoal.org.





Pittman HydroPark Prepares for Art Installations

Overlook residents and visitors who walk or bicycle past the Pittman Addition HydroPark at Concord and Going Court have noticed the changes made to the space in the past year. The Friends of Pittman Addition HydroPark secured a Community Livability Grant from the Portland Develop-

ment Commission to remove invasive plants and re-landscape the sound wall area with native plants. That work was done through a partnership with the Columbia Slough Watershed Council. The grant also paid for the installation of five sculpture pads, which were placed throughout the HydroPark.

Friends of Overlook Bluff Work to Preserve Land

Have you ever wondered about the future of Overlook Bluff? The steep slope, or escarpment, that offers a natural buffer between Swan Island, the rail yards and our neighborhood has become the focus of Friends of Overlook Bluff (FOOB). The bluff offers views of the Willamette River which shapes the character of our city and is home to vanishing habitat. Deer, coyotes, red-tailed hawks, peregrine falcons, great horned owls, Vaux swifts, and other migratory birds all rely on what remains of the river's forested bluff.

The vision of Friends of Overlook Bluff is to preserve the last undeveloped parcel of privately owned land on the bluff, restore native species along the east slope of the Willamette in North Portland, and create a series of trails that connect green space from Overlook to St. Johns. We want to protect what remains of a corridor of Oregon white oak and Pacific madrone habitat that once extended from Vancouver, BC, to

This irreplaceable land, located on Overlook Terrace, most recognizable for its Heritage White Oak tree, is in danger of being developed. The most urgent goal of Friends of Overlook Bluff is to influence city bureaus to cooperate with each other and with other governmental and nonprofit agencies to acquire the property. The property owner is willing to sell the land for a public purpose. The city has mandates to balance highdensity development of the Interstate Corridor with green space, to protect the Willamette watershed, and to create safe off-street trails for pedestrians.

Toward that goal, members of FOOB are in contact with the Bureau of Environmental Services, Metro, Portland Parks, nonprofit land trusts, East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District, SOLVE, and Audubon. The Friends' efforts will be most effective with strong support from the neighborhood and an indication that preserving and restoring Overlook Bluff is a priority. At the July 2012 OKNA General meeting, a motion was passed calling for a letter of support for FOOB's efforts from the Overlook Neighborhood Association.

FOOB has partnered with SOLVE for the first step in escarpment restoration. Our project is to remove invasive species from below the oak savannah on a Saturday in September. FOOB is also holding regular meetings; please contact us to be included on our mailing list for details about the restoration work day and meeting times.

As many of you may know, I have resigned from the City of Portland on August 2nd and my family and I are moving to Virginia Beach, VA., to be closer to family. This will be my last article in the Overlook Views and I wanted to take this opportunity to thank the many amazing residents and businesses in Overlook.

I have enjoyed the dual roles of being your neighbor residing on N. Sumner St. by Adidas for the

past six years and also as your Crime Prevention Coordinator with the City of Portland. I knew many residents and business owners prior to starting this position in December of 2008, but had no idea just how strong the sense of community was and continues in Overlook. As I got settled in this position, I immediately was impressed with the sense of community service and stewardship and was able to start new crime prevention and livability programs with relative ease due to high numbers of volunteers and support. I would like to highlight your neighborhood's public safety accomplishments and activities in the past few years:

► Started the City of Portland's first Livability

Team to report and remove illegal graffiti and clean streets throughout the neighborhood. This group of 20+ volunteers meets monthly and has been active for the past 3 years. The success of this team inspired City Council to create Livability Teams throughout the entire city and 9 out of the 11 North neighborhood associations have, or are forming their own team.

The Overlook 0 L T **Livability Team**

(OLT) meets monthly for regular graffiti and trash clean up. This diverse group gathers at 9:00 am on the first Sunday of the month (unless it falls on a holiday weekend, when meetings move to the second Sunday). We're always looking for new volunteers; email graffiti@OverlookNeighborhood.org for more

► Formed one of the strongest and most active Community Foot Patrols, initially named the "Beach School Foot Patrol" and now morphed into the "Overlook Foot Patrol". This amazing group of parents and residents watch over not only Beach Elementary School but large portions of N. Interstate Ave. and the Going St. pedestrian bridge. They are a shining example of our Foot Patrol program.

Over look Foot Patrol

Foot The Overlook Patrol patrols Beach School and the surrounding neighborhood. Commitments range from a one hour walk

with neighbors per week on up. This citizen-formed group is non-confrontational and reports problem activity. New walkers are always welcome and new areas developed; contact OKNA to get connected.

- ► Formed 8 new Neighborhood Watch groups throughout Overlook.
- Successfully shut down a long-term drug house that severely impacted dozens of residents just north of Overlook Park. What once was a street known for constant drug trafficking and disturbances is now quiet and safe again.
- ▶ Residents helped Portland Police serve a large and complex search warrant on N. Prescott just by I-5 that required the use of two City SWAT teams. This on-going investigation may result in the closure of the non-profit that manages this apartment complex and is potentially responsible for a significant portion of Overlook's property crime.
- ▶ Residents organized and ran one of the largest neighborhood public safety forums in City history. Some 160+ residents and business owners attended and showed the City of Portland Overlook is committed to safety and supports their law enforcement Officers.

PSAC

The North Portland Public Safety Action Committee (PSAC)

meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month to solve your crime problems. Meet at the Historic Kenton Firehouse, 2209 N Schofield from 7:00 pm—9:00 pm. Free Pizza!

This is just the beginning for Overlook and I am confident residents will continue to organize, communicate, and work closely with my replacement and the established partnerships with city and county public safety agencies.

As your neighbor I want to thank the Board members of our neighborhood association and the many community members who work so hard to keep this neighborhood the wonderful place it is. I would like to thank my amazing neighbors on N. Sumner St. who are my dear friends and I will truly miss each and every one of you. I have never lived anywhere longer than I have in Overlook and it is where my wife and I bought our first home and raised our wonderful daughter. We spent hours walking through the quiet streets and played until the sun went down at the many parks and school playgrounds. I was able to go to community meetings and say confidently and with pride that Overlook is a safe neighborhood where diversity is welcomed and looking out for your neighbor is a way of life.

For those who know me and have heard me speak, I am candid and don't like to sugarcoat things. Our city is facing some serious challenges and many complex issues from homelessness to the growing gang violence that sadly has impacted Overlook. I challenge you all to get involved, attend your neighborhood association meetings, start or rekindle a Neighborhood Watch group, and donate a few hours each month to your community. Most importantly, please support your police officers while never accepting crime or the fear of crime to change Overlook. Disaster Preparedness for Overlook 101

Building Community & Strengthening Readiness Among Neighbors

New Disaster Preparedness programs are being offered for small groups, typically the folks living on your block, that can plan and prepare together for increased resiliency and success. Suitable for newcomers or those with some training, this is a great way to make sure your family is ready.

Why should you test your home for radon???

Radon is a natural, radioactive gas that rises from the rocks and soil in the ground that seeps into homes and buildings through cracks in the foundation and walls.

Radon gas can become trapped inside a home and build to unhealthy levels. Any home can have a radon problem: new or old, well-insulated or drafty, with or without a basement.

Radon is a gas you cannot **see**, **smell**, or taste. The only way to tell if you are being exposed is by measuring radon levels.

Radon is hazardous to your health because it breaks down into solid particles known as radon decay products. These decay products can become trapped in the lungs when inhaled and damage lung tissue by emitting radiation.

Radon accounts for 12% (22,000) of lung cancer deaths each year according to the Surgeon General.

The Environmental Protection Agency quotes that an estimated 1 in 15 homes have an elevated level of radon.

There are simple and affordable solutions to radon problems in the home.


