Madrona Plaza: From Streetcars to Community Space

Overlook's emerging business district has some new additions, including recently completed changes that alter a vestige of our neighborhood's past. At the western end of the Overlook Village Business Association (OVBA) – spanning the section of North Killingsworth Street from I-5 to North Greeley Avenue – a new community space named Madrona Plaza has been completed with funding from the Portland Development Commission's (PDC) Interstate Corridor Urban Renewal Area and design by local business owner and landscape architect Steven Koch.

The Madrona Plaza name is a reference to Madrona Hill, the historic survey plat name for the area covers the Willamette nearby River bluff that had a preponderance of native Madrone trees (arbutus menziesii), which are broadleaf evergreens with rich orange-red bark. While the plaza honors the neighborhood's past, it also

represents a change to a unique feature of the street that dates back around 100 years. In the early 20th century, Portland's streetcar ran down Killingsworth Street and turned right onto Greeley Avenue on its way to St. Johns. The curving right turn led to the building's similarly-shaped front façade. After the rise of the automobile contributed to the end of Portland's first streetcar era, the former path of the streetcar was maintained as a right-turn slip lane for motor vehicles (see photo).

In 2003, the curving building that is adjacent to the street was purchased and renovated. Current owners Steven Koch and Miguel Barragan had long envisioned a plaza at the location that would give

neighbors a place to engage each other, safely sit outside, grab a newspaper or a cup of coffee, and perhaps even become а "landmark entry into the north Portland peninsula." Overlook Neighborhood Association Board member Tom Kilbane has been facilitating support for the project by acting as a liaison between the PDC, local businesses, and Overlook residents.

In addition to the vision for a neighborhood plaza, safety issues with the right-turn lane were a major factor in the funding that was dedicated for the project; according to PDC project manager Susan Kuhn, the project's primary outcome was to "improve safety for pedestrians, bicyclists and autos by eliminating the right-turn slip lane." Mr. Koch explained that the final design will improve safety as it allows for "greater sight distances for people exiting the parking lots and for pedestrians crossing Greeley and Killingsworth," whereas before, pedestrians were forced to cross two paths of vehicle travel.

So what comes next? As Overlook neighbors wait for winter to end and sunnier days to arrive, we can start thinking about using our new closed street/community plaza. Planting of trees, shrubs, and bioswale vegetation has yet to be completed, but the two local businesses abutting the plaza have permits for sidewalk tables ready to go. The end result should be a safer area for all modes of transportation and a public space that further activates one of Overlook's commercial intersections.



It's a great way to contribute your help when you don't have much free time to spare.

While I've enjoyed this work immensely over the past two years, I am moving out of the neighborhood and we are looking for a new Tree Planting Coordinator.

Some of the benefits I've experienced as coordinator include getting to know a lot of neighbors in Overlook, I've built some skills in communication and putting things together to get stuff done, and I've seen how with not too much effort, you can bring together hundreds of people to make great things happen. These were my first two years living in the neighborhood, and this experience made me feel at home and connected with the community. Its amazing how much other cool stuff you learn from talking with people about other stuff.

So what does the tree planting organizer do? Well its sort of up to you. There are some basic things that I'll go over here, and if you want there is room for extra ideas and effort. Friends of Trees helps organize the event. Actually they do most of it, and support you in everything that you do. I also will support you throughout the process.

Here are the basics:

- Work with Kaiser Permanente to set up the annual event at their place. 4 hours, Winter
- Call people who are interested in ordering trees to help them do it. 6 hours, Fall to December
- Call volunteers before the planting day to help them choose roles for the event. 6 hours, January
- Come to the planting event and coordinate volunteers. **6 hours**, **in January**
- Attend a few community events to promote tree planting. 8 hours, Summer and Fall
- Attend a few meetings with Friends of Trees to stay on the same page. 4 hours, Summer to January

Here are extras:

- Work with the Overlook Tree Team to coordinate neighborhood planting and tree maintenance
- Canvass the neighborhood to encourage more people to get trees.
- Start a native plant and tree planting initiative for the parking strips/pollinator pathways
- Mentor an aspiring youth environmental organizer
- You probably have better ideas than I do, so go for it!

Please call or email me to let me know if you are interested. I can answer questions, and tell you more about how it all goes down and the kind of help I can give you. Then you can decide if you want to get involved.

Plantings should continue to include a diverse array of species, genera, and families, particularly those other than maple (Acer) and in the rose (Rosaceae) family, which make up a large portion of Overlook's trees. Tree Challenges: The Other Side of the Leaf

Overlook Tree Team reaches out to solve care and maintenance issues with neighbors

Street trees have wonderful benefits to give to our community, but these gifts come with some interesting dilemmas. The City of Portland encourages planting of street trees with enthusiasm for a number of excellent reasons. Trees are capable of substantially reducing the cost of storm water treatment by conserving water and reducing erosion, reducing urban temperatures in the summer and fight greenhouse effects, reducing air and noise pollution, increasing wildlife habitat, and saving energy costs.

The lovely spring blossoms and full-leafed beauty of our street trees in summer, which shade us from the hot sun and brighten the look of our inner city, give way every year in the blustery autumn when their leaves wave goodbye and become yard debris and compost. However, while many of our neighbors are diligent composters, not everyone is willing or able to use leaves in this way. For many, the leaves can pose difficult challenges. They can be hard to rake and dispose of, slippery to walk, bike or drive on, and can cause backed up storm drains. And, as these trees grow and mature, they must be maintained to

allow them to remain healthy and to age gracefully without causing damage. They must be removed at the end of their healthy lives, as trees will eventually reach their lifespan and need to be "re-purposed" by removal.

While street trees are the city's property, the burden of maintaining them has long been ours as homeowners. Several community members raised the challenges posed by this obligation on property owners as a topic of discussion at our November neighborhood general meeting last year.

Our community has many lovers of trees who dearly value the urban forest here in Portland, and especially in Overlook. And these neighbors also recognize the maintenance challenges faced by homeowners and property owners. So, a group of us hope to formulate some methods to help address these issues as a neighborhood, possibly pooling resources and purchasing services as a group to obtain tree maintenance discounts. We have also begun to approach the City's Urban Forestry Board in hopes of raising the visibility of these issues city-wide.

Overlook Street Tree Inventory Results

Overlook's street tree population

Last summer, volunteers worked with Portland Parks & Recreation's Urban Forestry division to conduct a street tree inventory in the Overlook Neighborhood. Only street trees were inventoried, those trees between the street curb and the sidewalk in the planting strip. Over the course of three monthly workshops, 31 volunteers contributed 175 hours collecting data on 3,575 trees. Data collected included tree type (species or genus), condition, size (diameter at breast height), planting strip width, and presence of overhead high voltage lines. Data was supplemented with available planting space data collected by the Bureau of Environmental Services. Data analysis and recommendations were completed by PP&R Urban Forestry

Environmental & Aesthetic Benefits:

was assessed to quantify the dollar value of annual environmental services and aesthetic benefits provided by trees: energy conservation, air quality improvement, carbon dioxide reduction, stormwater control, and property value increase. The model relies on tree size and species, as well as current pricing for electricity rates, median home resale value, regional stormwater interception costs, and costs of tree maintenance. Overlook's street trees provide nearly \$295,000 annually in environmental services and aesthetic benefits. Each tree provides an average of \$82 worth of benefits annually. The replacement cost of Overlook's tree population is valued at \$11,104,640.

Urban Forestry Recommendations:

Overlook's street tree stocking level

is 64%, which means that 64% of possible planting spaces are filled, a pretty decent number. There still remains, however, 1,681 spaces for planting street trees. Of this available planting space 407 spaces are greater than 6 feet, without overhead wires and could support larger, more valuable trees.

Broadleaved evergreens are underrepresented at less than 1% of all trees in Overlook. As these trees hold onto leaves through the winter, they provide year round benefits to the neighborhood and mean less leaves to clean up. There are many beautiful broadleaved evergreens to chose from, including Southern Magnolia and Pacific Madrone, just to mention two of my favorites. Planting in the smallest planting strips is not a priority, as they provide very little return on investment. However, all plantings help contribute to a neighborhood "tree ethic" and encourage others to plant.



Overlook Neighborhood Public Safety Forum

On the evening of October 19, 2011, approximately 150 Overlook neighbors and special guests gathered at the Kaiser Town Hall ballroom for a public safety forum. The event was organized by and for neighbors as a way to share information and introduce everyone to key people in our community who work (and volunteer) to make Overlook a safe place to live and work.

Those attending were first able to visit information tables and chat with agency representatives that included the Bureau of Emergency Communication (911), Office of Neighborhood Involvement (Graffiti Abatement), Portland Police, Portland Parks and Recreation Parks Rangers, as well as representatives from our own Beach Foot Patrol, Overlook Neighborhood Association, and Overlook Livability Team.

After the open house portion of the evening, attendees were seated and Overlook Crime Prevention Coordinator Mark Wells emcee'd a panel discussion that featured North Police Precinct Commander Mike Leloff, the Portland Police Gang Enforcement Team, Multnomah County District Attorney Jim Hayden, Lt. Tony Silva of the Transit Police, Capt. Greg Wong from the Portland Fire Bureau, and Kaiser's head of security, Bob Smith – to name a few of the participants. At the time of the event, parts of Overlook were experiencing a number of suspicious home fires, but luckily that activity has died down. Neighbors also worked with police to close down a drug house in Overlook (south of Going) in a very dramatic and effective early morning police raid, so that was also discussed at the forum.

Speakers at the event stressed the importance of filling out a police report if neighbors see or experience crime in Overlook. Filling out a police report is important because the Police Bureau assigns patrols based on where crime is occurring. If neighbors do not report crime, then the police assume Overlook is a safe place and they assign officers elsewhere. Filling out a report is easy and only takes a few minutes; you can do it online at www.portlandonline.com/police. The forum may have been responsible for one very positive outcome: Mark Wells reports that Overlook has recently been assigned a dayshift district officer – so we now have officers assigned to Overlook for all three shifts.

After the forum, neighbors started a Facebook community page to share safety information as well as other musings about the neighborhood. Recently two neighbors reported garage break-ins; one in broad daylight with the neighbor home! You can "like" this site (Overlook Neighborhood Community) and join in the conversation. Mark Wells also maintains an email distribution list that was started at the forum and he shares safety information and announcements with Overlook residents.

We hope to make the safety forum an annual event, but in the meantime, if you have any safety questions or concerns, or would like to be added to Mark's email list, please contact him (see box).

Crime Prevention Update

Greetings, Overlook residents, I hope you all have had a safe few months and a happy holiday season. We are into 2012 and I wanted to update you all on several crime trends we are seeing in the Overlook area and some basic crime prevention practices to help minimize your chances of becoming a victim

Car Prowls

A constant crime issue for the Overlook area is continual car break-ins or car

prowls. These are the number one crime in the City. Please keep your parked car locked at all times and remove ALL VALUABLE ITEMS. The vast majority of car prowl victims I speak to admit to leaving valuable items in plain view. This simple step can really help prevent this too common crime.

Tresspass

Of particular note is an increase in reported

trespassing on private residential property and property theft from residential yards and garages. Residents are finding backvard gates left open in the morning and there have been reports of property and especially recycling stored in backyards being stolen.

Here are some tips to help prevent these crimes:

- ⋆ Lock and secure all gates and fences leading to backyard areas.
- * Add motion lighting to side entrances and gate areas.
- ⋆ Do not keep valuable items like tools and ladders in plain view.
- ⋆ Lock and add lighting to any garages or outdoor sheds.

Budget Cuts Are Coming—

I would like to make you all aware of the upcoming City of Portland budget cuts and ask you all to get involved and participate in the budget process. At the writing of this article all City Bureaus including Police and Fire, are looking at substantial cuts. We are facing the potential loss of 50 sworn police officers with the current forecasted budget of approximately a 4% cut to the Police Bureau's Budget. Please contact your City

Council and speak up for the services and programs you feel are the most important.

stant calls regarding soliciting at residen-

tial front doors and also regarding individuals going through garbage and recycling. Here are some tips and my advice on how to minimize problems with both.

For unwanted solicitation:

- ★ Install a clearly visible "No Soliciting" sign by your front door.
- ⋆ Politely tell any solicitors who disregard your sign to leave.
- * We have criminals in Overlook posing as solicitors so remain vigilant.
- * Call the police if the person does not immediately leave your property.

For trash and recycling issues:

- ⋆ Do not put your trash and/or recycling out on the street until the morning (if able).
- * Do not leave or accumulate cans and bottles in plain view anywhere on your prop-
- ★ If you see an individual on your property obviously looking for cans/bottles, politely ask them to leave and inform them they are not to be on your property. I've had multiple reports of individuals going through backyards and on front and rear porches claiming to be just looking for cans/bottles. If you see anyone in your yard, especially at night or in a rear or gated area of your property please call 911 and do not confront the individual.

ing a much better job. Our overall crime is up from 2010 compared to 2011. There were 607 total reported crimes in Overlook in 2010 versus 712 reported crimes for 2011. I believe this is due to much more accurate and timely crime reporting along with an uptick in property crimes such as car prowls and property theft most North Portland neighborhoods are currently experiencing. Please keep helping me spread the work about on-line crime reporting and why it's so important. For the first time in over a year, Overlook now enjoys a dedicated District Police Officer for all three shifts. Crime victims filing those reports are a huge part to getting the police coverage Overlook requires and deserves....so THANK


