Meadowscaping on the Bluff

Rolling into summer Friends of Overlook Bluff have been keeping pace with sunny adventures. On June 2nd we held a Native Plant Sale in the field/oak meadow on Overlook Terrace. We earned \$800 at our first neighborhood fundraiser. Thank you to the thriving community of native plant lovers and novices using species that are original to the Northwest

oak habitat for landscaping. Benefits of native habitat are the bees and butterflies they attract that in turn promotes abundant plant growth that in turn creates health benefits for our whole ecological system. In keeping with their commitment to the environment, Bosky Dell Nursery loaned us the native species at no cost up front! Their location in Tualatin is open year-round with a huge and beautiful selection of plants, shrubs and trees.

Generosity of material donations also flowed for our trial run at oak meadowscaping on July 20th. The field is now home to three 20' diameter circles of green nitrogen, cardboard and burlap 'lasagna'. The cardboard came from KJ in Sellwood who stepped in to help strangers in the eleventh hour and offered to get us boxes that line pallets used in trucking. (Good fortune has abounded in our progress but KJ really blew me away). Our source for free burlap is a local supplier of coffee beans who make it available for

"The Captain's Walk" is now noted by street sign toppers between N. Dolphin and the Willamette Greenway Trail at McCarthy Park along N. Channel Avenue. Street trees as well as an 8' sidewalk were installed in 2012 with bio-swales due this year to capture storm water off the street. The project is funded by grants from ODOT and City of Portland BES.

The Swan Island Business Association proposed the name "The Captain's Walk" in Captain Head's

honor. It may be seen along N. Channel Avenue just south of N. Commerce Street. It sits adjacent to a cross placed, we are told, anonymously by the operator of the vehicle that took the Captain's life 15 years ago.

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Sustainable Overlook a Transition Neighborhood: Resilient, Connected, Sustainable

Pesticide Free Overlook is On The Way to Reality

Overlook is on its way to becoming Portland's first pesticide-free neighborhood with over 250 households taking Metro's healthy lawn and garden pledge. Sustainable Overlook members have been registering households and will soon be knocking on doors to invite neighbors to take the pledge and help connect them with natural gardening resources.

Municipalities in other states and countries have eliminated cosmetic pesticides and have shown a city can be beautiful, productive, cost-effective and healthy. We hope Pesticide-free Overlook will be a model for other neighborhoods in Portland and beyond. Demonstrating community consensus and broad concern sends a strong message to retailers, landscape services companies, and legislators that public opinion is on the side of eliminating toxic chemical exposure. Hopefully our efforts pave the way for responsible regulations

Recent mass bee poisonings in the Portland area have been upsetting but have raised awareness about the effects of pesticides and legislation is underway to protect pollinators. While these incidents killed huge numbers of beneficial insects, acute and chronic poisoning on a smaller scale happens every day in neighborhoods all over the country. In Overlook, there are many persistent exposures to environmental toxins, such as poor air quality from industry and vehicle emissions, radon in homes, and lead contamination in soil. Of these risks, eliminating landscape chemicals is a relatively easy step to take.

A 2012 statement by the American Academy of Pediatrics says that pesticides pose increased risks of cancer, asthma, autism, ADHD and cognitive impairment, especially in children. Given the stark choice between these ill effects and having some clover in your lawn, I believe nearly everyone would choose the clover. And we should welcome the clover with enthusiasm, knowing that it provides food for bees (and clover honey is delicious!) and needs less mowing and water than lawn grass. Plus it takes nitrogen from the air and makes it available as fertilizer to the plants around it. That kind of relationship is what biologists and economists call 'ecosystems services.' By encouraging these relationships in our garden, we can reap benefits in the form of healthy vegetables, fruits, herbs, and honey. Natural gardening can also save you money and offers the added perk of a beautiful and healthy yard. By gardening naturally you can also provide habitat, manage your storm water, and recycle nutrients by composting. Now that's a more balanced ecosystem!

If you've always gardened without pesticides, you may be wondering how to get your well-deserved ladybug yard sign. Maybe you're ready to go non-toxic and are wondering how to start. Or perhaps you are just interested in reducing pesticide use in your yard and want to know what your least toxic-options are. Whatever the case may be, there is an abundance of resources for you including Metro, our Soil and Water Conservation District, The Xerxes Society, NCAP fact sheets and Sustainable Overlook gardening classes.

Steps for Healthy Gardening

Want to get started but feeling daunted? We've all been there; let's help each other!

- Drop off old pesticides at Metro's Household hazardous waste site. It's free with the coupon you get when you take the pledge.
- Choose pesticide-free (untreated) lumber for landscaping projects.
- Start from the ground up by feeding your soil with compost and mulch. If you need to fertilize, opt for organic products.
- Plant natives and provide habitat for pest-eating birds and beneficial insects.
- 'Use tools not toxics' Pull weeds and squish pest insects instead of spraying.
- Appreciate diversity. A few weeds in your lawn or a few nibbles on the leaves of your veggies are a sign of a healthy garden ecosystem.. and they won't kill you.
- Make some gardener friends. Our neighborhood is lucky to have experienced gardeners on each block who are happy to share knowledge, seeds and plants.

Intersection Repair Update

"Intersection Repair" is such a strange term, but it really explains what has happened at the big intersection of N. Overlook Blvd, Concord Ave, Failing St and Melrose. It's near the Overlook House, if the names aren't familiar.

A year ago June, 200+ neighbors turned out to paint the intersection, and this year some 90 of us washed the painting (with help from Engine 24 – thank you, you were AWE-SOME!) and completed the Repair by building, painting and installing 9 big planters – ON the intersection! Our goals, the goals that prompted the whole project: have a terrific couple of neighborhood events, and make this large and complex intersection safer.

ume of bike traffic grew rapidly. Neighbors on the intersection (I am one) saw - or had - some 'near misses', in which bikes and cars came close to colliding. Our idea was to alter the intersection so people would see each other. We got a permit for the street graphic and the OK to put the planters in - placed so that they extend the curbs of Overlook and Failing - to 'correct' the intersection so it is used safely. The conditions for the planters were that they be low and planted with low plants, and that they be light colored and very visible. PBOT's permit is specific: designs using white, pale blue and pale gold paint and reflective glass beads to make the planters visible in headlights.

The day of the event was such fun, with our builders getting the planters put together and our painters getting the designs laid out and painted. We had a great crew of young painters helping! When the designs were painted, and the other three sides were painted white, some of the young kids came to me and asked if they could paint the other sides. I loved their enthusiasm, and

said 'yes, just let us get all the designs painted, and then you can use the left-over paint.' So they did – their additions are joyful,

First Sculpture Installed at Pittman Addition HydroPark

P.I.R. Moves With the Times: Pull Over, Cars

Changing markets, changing patterns of recreation, changing demographics, all have an impact on what you do with a recreation facility. At Portland International Raceway, it has been a decade of change, but much of it is invisible to the neighborhoods around the track.

PIR, as many don't realize, is a City of Portland park site, run as an enterprise fund


(meaning no tax dollars coming from the general fund, instead all revenue for operations, maintenance, salaries - everything to run the park - comes from event rentals and promotions). We hold nearly 600 "event days" per year, often holding three or four events simultaneously, and nearly 400,000 people come through the gates each year.

But change is happening at PIR as well. With a battered economy having an impact on family budgets, recreation is the first line item to go, across many of the tradi-

tional track users. We host sports car racing, drag racing, motorcycle road racing and motocross events, and some of those groups have struggled to keep their participants involved, with both the economy and an aging cohort of race fans and participants.

And PIR adapts.

In addition to the motorized racing, we also do a lot of

A month and a half after the event, I'm delighted to say that the planters seem to be working just the way we intended! First of all, they are plenty visible – the glass reflector beads make them really shine in headlights! And cars turning onto Concord from Overlook are slowing down to make what is now a sharper turn, and bikes coming down the hill on Concord are slowing down and moving a bit to their right before merging onto Overlook. Everyone is

moving more slowly, has great sight lines and can see everyone else much better. The plants are still alive! And we haven't had to lose any of the blueberries! (we all know which blueberries I mean, right?!)

This project is really a test case for PBOT - they have never let neighbors try to alter traffic flow in this kind of way. And considering that the project was funded by donations and grants, and 'built' by neighbors, it may be a model for other neighbors who want to make their streets safer. And these wooden planters may lead the way to more permanent ones.

As a first of its kind, of course, we are seeing how a project like this works and we're already learning from the experience. First, a big thanks to the Rebuilding Center for the recycled cedar - from the deconstructed house on Overlook! - and to Arciform for the design and millwork. The planters have had some 'technical difficulties' - the largest have cracked from the weight of the donated soil (a big thank you to PBOT's Sun-

the designs that face 'out', some have liked the designs that face 'in', some wished they could have stayed the beautiful recycled wood, some worry that they are confusing and may cause problems for drivers. It turns out that because of the hill on Concord, the slope of the intersection where the planters are placed, and the high lots of the houses surrounding the intersection, all sides of the planters are very visible, not just the sides facing the street.

Since we all have different ideas about what we like, what we think is beautiful, or fun, etc., I'm interested in hearing what neighbors think about the project: Do you like that the intersection is different now? Do you like the street painting? Did you like the painting and planter-making events? Do you like that the intersection has become a neighborhood attraction? Do you like the way the planters change the flow of traffic? Do you like their appearance? Do you like the materials? Would you like to see more Overlook intersections 'repaired'?

Keeping an Eye on Crime Stats

Burglaries and car prowls have long been a concern and issue for Overlook residents. Fortunately, the numbers of reported car prowls and burglaries in Overlook has decreased significantly. The number of reported burglaries in Overlook from January-June 2013 is down by 69% when compared to the same time period in 2012. Additionally, the number of reported car prowls in Overlook for the period January-June 2013 has decreased by 47% when compared to the same time period in 2012. When compared to all of North Precinct, burglaries and car prowls in Overlook account for only 2.5% and 4.8% of reported calls from January-June 2013, respectively.

"Warm-Weatherizing" Your Home for Safety

In the warmer weather, it is tempting to open windows around the house to allow for the cool summer breeze to enter. To help keep only the breeze from entering your house, think about installing secondary locks on your window, which allows the window to open no more than four inches. Secondary locks come in many varie-

ties, and are tailored for specific types of windows. Some you simply screw on to the track with your fingers, others require drilling in to the window frame. These locks are perfect for a summer breeze...not for a burglar.

Vacation Planning

Here are some tips to help protect your home while you are out:

- Be sure to notify your neighbors so they can keep an eye out on your house
- Don't make your home look like it's vacated; install photosensitive lights so they turn on at dusk and turn off at dawn
- If you will be out of town for an extended period of time, place holds on your mail and newspapers
- Ask a neighbor to bring your garbage and recycling in and out

Unwelcome Campers and Moving Along

Have you ever wondered what to do about unwelcome campers in the neighborhood and how removal is handled? The question comes up at nearly every monthly OKNA meeting: Can you remove the XYZ camp? It's not as simple as it sounds! This list explains what you can do and how the process works:

- Contact City of Portland non-emergency phone number: 503 823-3333
- Officers will make contact with the individuals (may have warrants outstanding about 25% do)
- Next step officers will contact JOIN which offers resources to homeless individuals
- If they indicate to JOIN that they want to have help, there may be a delay in clearing the camp
- Officers "post" the camp with a bright orange notice giving 24 hours to vacate
- Generally they are given 3-4 days before the camp is disrupted
- Removal of the camp is scheduled through Metro with inmate work crew within several weeks
- Personal property is catalogued and stored in a location for up to 30 days
- It takes an average of 3 to 10 days for removal if the City takes responsibility
- It takes an average of 1-3 weeks for removal if ODOT takes responsibility
- If the camp is on ODOT property, you may still report it to Portland Police, who will pass the information on to ODOT


Information provided by Officer Steve Jacquot, Overlook's Neighborhood Response Team Officer – 503.823.5700 opportunist is hoping for. It bears repeating that most crimes are indeed crimes of opportunity. If we take those opportunities away, perhaps our neighborhood will continue to be a safe and comfortable place for us to live.

We are reminded by our local police officers and crime prevention coordinators to be alert and vigilant to things that seem out of the ordinary to us. Remember that as the regular residents, dog walkers, strollers, and bikers in our neighborhood, we know it best, so we are uniquely qualified to notice and report anything unusual. Sometimes the smallest observation can be the detail that helps the police pull together the details of a case, whether it is a car prowl, a burglary, theft, or a graffiti "artist".

It is also important to report all crimes, even petty thefts and vandalism. Police reports help the officers assigned to our neighborhood see trends in the making. And your reports of crimes on our facebook page help your neighbors to stay informed and alert. Make your online reports at the Portland Police Bureau's link: www.portlandonline.com/police/cor/. Post crimes and vandalism at our facebook page: www.facebook.com/OKNAinPDX.

Recent meetings by city departments have educated neighbors about graffiti, sex offenders, car prowls, and managing chronic homeless residents (see sidebar) and partying visitors at local parks. At a graffiti summit, speakers educated attendees about how destructive and expensive graffiti can be, and how to take steps to minimize the damage and incidents of graffiti, as well as the culture of the vandals who consider themselves "artists". At a PSAC meeting the city's sexual offender registry officers explained again the importance of reporting anything that seems unusual. Portland Parks rangers and Portland Police are working together to monitor and enforce the prohibitions on alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs in our parks.

Overlook is a safe and comfortable neighborhood. Working together, our attention to our community and neighbors will keep it a wonderful place to live. Unusual activity can be reported by contacting the Portland Police Bureau's non-emergency number: 503-823-3333.

volved in advanced programming. To this end, she has established a fund to purchase some special computers.




