

OKNA Elections/ Bylaws Update on September Agenda

Every year the members of OKNA elect a new board at the September General Meeting (always the 3rd Tuesday of the month). This year that meeting is on September 16 at 7:00 pm at the Kaiser Town Hall at 3704 N. Interstate. And YOU are the members of OKNA, so come to the meeting, participate, get your feet wet in aid of your neighborhood and consider joining the board! Every September there's a new opportunity to refresh our board with new energy, enthusiasm, faces and ideas. Join us to make that happen, after you have enjoyed the events and information planned and provided by your current board.

This year's September meeting will also be an opportunity to vote to adopt some changes to our bylaws. Every organization should take the time to re-visit and review their bylaws every few years but the last time ours were updated was in spring 1998!! The proposed revised bylaws can be found on our website, so take the time to review them for vourselves and see how our hard-working bylaws subcommittee and the full board did on bringing these up-to-date. Many of the changes simply recognized the way we already operate, such as membership requests don't need to made in writing, and board members stand for election annually. A few were about bringing our language current - no more "sub-neighborhoods", we proposed they be called "areas". Two substantive changes we proposed: adding an area for Swan Island, so we can have a representative from there, and allowing the board to make a decision by email for an emergency administrative function, such as adding a speaker

Leeta Slusher: Essence of Overlook

The street signs read both "Forest St" and "Skidmore Terrace" when Leeta Slusher moved to the Overlook in 1945. The name of the street had been changed a dozen years earlier but no one had bothered to remove the old blue enamel sign. Leeta grew her family here, off and on for over 50 years.

Sometimes depth of character over-rides life accomplishments and that certainly describes Leeta. A friend to many, certainly. When a co-worker lost his leg in an industrial accident Leeta took him in to live with the family for three years until he could manage on his own. For years she nightly "pilfered" change from her husband's trousers and built a sizeable secret bank account. The sole purpose of the account was to anonymously help people in the neighborhood. No one ever knew where the money came from.

Her simple rules were:

"We seek to give people a hand- up not a hand- out. We make every effort to remain anonymous."

And: "Grace is a gift from God, but who says that God cannot work through us if we listen and heed his guidance."

Life is not fair, but sometimes it should be. We see a person in a tough circumstance and we say to ourselves, "That's not fair". She sought through her anonymous sharing to level the playing field of life. When she saw a person who either could not achieve their natural potential due to circumstances that were not of their choosing or who were in need of a temporary lift to sustain them during a low point in their life's journey she asked, what it is that prevents this person from achieving their full potential? The funds were an attempt to supply that missing element. The funds were offered as a means of directing grace into that person's life travel.

"Hard traveling" was what Leeta often called it. She was right when she said that we do our best growing when we are challenged by a painful situation. She did not seek to relieve that pain but rather to sustain the person during that time.

Bless her.

The benches at Overlook Bluff were installed and are maintained as a memorial to Leeta and other wonderful residents of past decades by an emeritus resident of Overlook. Watch for QR code plaques on the benches, that will lead readers to more Overlook stories on our website.

Real Estate Recap

Here is a round-up of recent real estate sales completed in the past few months in the Overlook neighborhood. Thanks to neighbor **Emily Ordas** of. M Realty (503-267-4946) for sourcing this information for you!

There has been a heavy load of activity in our neighborhood in the past few months. Since our last issue, Overlook has seen 28 detached homes, 8 condos and 3 attached homes sell. People must realize how super awesome this neighborhood is to live in! Average days on the market for detached homes came

in at 20 days, but that is heavily skewed by a house that sat on the market for for 294 days. If you leave that house out, the average was only 10 days on the market. Many houses sold in 2-3 days and over asking price, with cash buyers. It's no secret that Overlook is one of the hottest areas to get into on the inner east side, and here are the numbers to prove it.



The bigger real estate picture is as follows: Portland Metro's average home price the first half of the year was \$328,900, up 8.7% from the same time frame in 2013 when the average was \$302,700. In the same comparison period, the median price also rose 8.7% from \$257,500 in the first half of 2013 to \$280,000 in the same period of 2014. We'll leave it to you to judge whether this is good news or not!

The 3rd annual neighborhood garden tour was a fun and inspirational day for over 80 neighbors and friends and raised funds for the Pesticide Free Overlook Project. Ten gardens were open and demonstrated a wide variety of pesticide free gardening styles, including the Historic Elliot House with its pollinator garden, Friends of Overlook Bluff's oak meadow restoration project, Jan-Marc Wine Cellars and five certified Backyard Habitats. The tour was more bike-friendly this year thanks to bike racks provided by Good Sport Promotions and many participants toured by bike. Also new this year were information tables from organizations such as Metro, Xerces Society and East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation District at each stop.

Garden host Leslee Lewis says: "The best part of the garden tour for me as a host was how

much the neighbors enjoyed it - they appreciated the diversity of gardens on the tour – there really was something for everyone. I tend to only notice the unfinished

aspects of my garden, but hearing how much neighbors enjoyed it reminded me that it's a great, constantly evolving project that has tremendous beauty at every stage!"

Of the many tour highlights, former City of Portland Green Building planner Mike O'Brien's garden and eco-roof spurred a lot of conversations. He generously allowed neighbors to see his green roof up-close from his second story terrace. Leslee commented, "I had wanted to see Mike's house and garden ever since I first heard he was a neighbor - it was a terrific opportunity to see his gorgeous garden and thoughtfully designed house!" The eco-roof helps slow and filter rain runoff, mitigates temperatures in the house and provides pollinator habitat.

A more frequent natural gardening element seen on the tour this year were eco-lawns. Many of the tour hosts have eliminated unused lawn space and allowed nitrogen-fixing clover to grow among the remaining turf grass with for natural fertilization and a greener look in summer. Eco-lawn seed mixes are available to start a new lawn or over seed an existing area of turf to create a more diverse and resilient plant mix that needs less water, less frequent mowing and provides better habitat.

100 % College Acceptance for De La Salle's 2014 Seniors

At the intersection of N Interstate Avenue and N Lombard St, you'll find an ambitious and successful North Portland school. De La Salle North Catholic High School, started in 2001, provides a quality education for motivated college-bound students from North/Northeast Portland, many of whom are underserved and would not have an opportunity to receive a similar education elsewhere.

The majority of our students are African American, Latino or Asian. Students offset the cost of their education by working one day each week in a Corporate Internship at 80 businesses like Nike, Stoel Rives and OHSU. Over 97% of graduating seniors go college. We have increased our student population from a mere 74 students in 2001 to 336 students this year. No student is turned away due to an inability to pay. In fact, to ensure our focus on low-income families, we require that families earn below 75% of median area income.



In 2014 De La Salle North Catholic High School was the only high school in the state to have three Gate's Millennium Scholars. Our graduating class this year alone sent students on to Columbia, Dartmouth, Notre Dame, Xavier, Pomona, University of Oregon, Portland State, University of Portland and Spelman, among many others.

What do our kids do, to make them so successful? Our major programs and activities include:

- A complete four year academic college prep curriculum focused on major areas such as math, language arts, history, and sciences.
- Student participation in our corporate work program. Operating in teams of four at various entry level positions, each student works five days per month at one of 80 paying corporate sponsors. By the time a student leaves De La Salle North, they will have worked over 1,440 hours in the corporate world.
- Sports, including basketball, soccer, volleyball, wrestling and track.
- Club activities like dance, drama, con law, and more.
- Service opportunities include service to the homeless, immersion trips to the

- Extracurriculars like dances, pep rallies and, of course, the prom.
- Small school/small class size: Our student teacher ratio of 18:1 and a total student body this coming year of just over 300, students receive the individualized attention needed to thrive.

Even though our tuition is just \$2,995 for a full year, over 80% of families receive financial aid. Most students attend De La Salle on full scholarship. Although we are a Catholic school, it is not a requirement to attend and most students at the school are not Catholic.

Sign Up for Public Alerts & Get the News

Emergency Alerts Cover Many Agencies

If the police are apprehending an armed criminal in your neighborhood, an alert may keep you out of harm's way. If water is contaminated or there is a chemical spill, notification may preserve your health. We have seen these incidents happen. Signing up for public alerts will put you on the list to receive real time information about critical incidents that occur in the city.

When an incident occurs, the responding agency (Police, Fire, or Water), will determine a perimeter of residents who need to be notified. They will then contact the Bureau of Emergency Communications who fields 9-1-1 and non-emergency calls and activates the reverse 9-1-1 system. All residents who have a landline within the perimeter will be contacted. For cell phones, only those residents who have signed up for public alerts within that perimeter will be notified by a call, text, and/or email about the incident. Those who do not have a landline and have not explicitly signed up for public alerts will not receive the information.

When signing up for public alerts, there is a section that allows individuals with disabilities and mobility issues to indicate that they may need assistance during an emergency. This will help emergency personnel identify residents who require additional help during a critical incident.

Please sign up for public alerts at **www.publicalerts.org** today. This will help you receive critical information as it happens. These alerts are not issued frequently. When they are, it represents critical information that citizens need to know immediately.



Car Prowl Device: True or Not?

The Mysterious Car Prowl Tool



As some of you may have heard, there is a device out there that allows for thieves to easily car prowl. However, there has been a lot of misinformation

about these devices. Central Precinct's Neighborhood Response Team (NRT) Officer Dave McCormick created a helpful information release to help residents decipher the truth vs fiction when it comes to these devices.

Most people are aware of the inherent risks of leaving property or valuables inside an unattended vehicle. A locked car is about as secure as a using the word "password" as your computer password. Leaving any property in plain view is a red carpet invitation for a thief to break a window and steal that camera, laptop, purse, or gym bag. But thieves are beginning to use a different method to steal property from cars.

There is a lot of urban legend surrounding a device thieves are using which defeats the keyless entry system of some modern vehicles. An Internet search reveals a host of theories, conspiracies, and grainy video. Though police investigations continue, let's try to sort truth from fiction:

FICTION

• The device **does not** capture the signal between the keyfob and vehicle, allowing the would-be thief to clone the car remote and gain access.

• The device is **unlikely** to jam the lock signal, allowing the would-be thief to gain access to a car believed to be locked.

• The device **does not** work on all cars, regardless of make, model and year.

TRUTH

• The device is **hand-held** and deployed through either close proximity or touching the target vehicle.

• The device appears to **exploit a weakness** in the factory alarm system, fooling the vehicle into unlocking its own doors.

• The device allows the thieves to gain access to **certain makes, models, and years** of cars. A vehicle pattern has not yet been established but newer model cars may not be immune.

Historically, thieves looking to steal property from cars would first check the interior, looking for a potential item of interest worth smashing the window and taking. With the device in hand, the thief simply walks down the street, entering any vehicle which responds to the unlock signal.

The most effective method to prevent loss of valuables and property is leaving your vehicle showroom clean. If you *must* leave

valuables inside a vehicle, place those items in the trunk and disable the internal trunk release. Though not a perfect solution, this is *the* best deterrent at this time.

Finally, if you believe you've been a car prowl victim, please report that crime to the police. This will allow our investigations to more accurately track and potentially solve these sorts of crimes.

Business Changes & Buildings After 20 years, early Overlook eatery Beaterville Café at 2201 N. Killingsworth has closed up shop. The building and the business are for sale. Thanks for all the wonderful breakfasts and the neighborhood's

first espresso machine. Also closed, but with no more news is the Madrona Hill Café at 5937 N. Greeley Ave.; we hear there is a lot of interest in the space. The delicious baked goods, coffee and comfy space will be sorely missed in north Overlook. Di Prima Dolci's owner has also retired, after serving Overlook for 11 delicious years. Baker and restaurateur Pat Di Prima went all in with her beautiful space, love of the neighborhood and authentic New York style Italian fare. She's considering a future venture, so keep your ears open for news and watch her Facebook page.

Atomic Pizza is a young business making their move; they have vacated their original location and purchased the former Di Prima Dolci location at 1936 N Killinsworth, tripling their original workspace and offering options for all sorts of expansion. Filling in the former Atomic location at 2150 N Killingsworth this fall is MilkGlass Mrkt, a restaurant/market combo offering breakfast, brunch, small plates, beer, wine and cocktails, according to a sign in the window. You may know them as the owners of the former Moxie RX cart on N Mississippi. Handsome Pizza and the carts in the North Station Food Cart pod at 730 N Killingsworth will be with us through the balance of the year, but expect new locations for them as an apartment building goes up on their busy corner lot.

It will be hard to replace the convenient Ainsworth after 10 years. But, to cheer us up, we look across the street to a renovation project many of us have cheered on at 4212 N Interstate, where Associated Antiques has transformed the former Jim's Interstate Auto (Jim Jensen has retired) across from the Overlook Family Restaurant. They promise a multidisciplinary platform that unites creative artisans with a café, antiques & vintage goods and artistic services. Look for style nods to the original Walt's Associated service station and a vibrant patio.

Development News of Note

Daimler Trucks North America broke ground this month at the site of its new headquarters building on Swan Island. DTNA is placing a priority on creating an environmentally-conscious plan with the goal to achieve LEED Platinum Certification. During the demolition phase of the project, the company surpassed its goal to recycle at least 96 percent of all demolition material or donate it to The Rebuilding Center in North Portland. In addition, DTNA is working with the Port of Portland to significantly enhance the greenway trail that runs through the property along the Willamette River to promote better access and enjoyment by the public.

Plans have been approved by the City for a new apartment building on Overlook Park, and developer Vic Remmers tells us they will apply for their permits by early September, and his group is excited to finally starting construction on the project. They are mindful of the impact they'll have on the immediate neighbors and park and promise to limit it "as best we can." He adds a "thank you to the Overlook Neighborhood for their support and feedback."

In a nod to neighbors' concerns, the City of Portland Bureau of Development Services (BDS) has implemented a new Courtesy Demolition Notification Process as part of an effort to encourage developers to provide neighborhood notification of pending demolitions of single-family homes when notification is not required by code.
