Going & Greeley: Derailment, Repairs, and More Construction

On Saturday, September 7, a Union Pacific train pulling a line of tank cars containing LP gas derailed into the Going Street Bridge onto Swan Island. Thankfully there was no major issue with the LP gas tanker cars, but the impact of the engines on the bridge was significant.

The middle section of the bridge is the old 2-lane road built in 1930 while the outer sections on either side were added in 1976. All three sections were connected back a decade ago to better withstand an earthquake. The really good news is the bridge is still standing! Portland Bureau of Transportation was able to reopen one lane each way by the next weekday commute and then another lane onto the island the following week. PBOT is trying to add a second lane heading up the hill soon, but there is limited room to work with an active rail line underneath complicating the situation.

Repairs will occur at night to minimize the traffic impact. The contract to repair the damage has been let, and PBOT hopes to have all the lanes on the bridge open in the Spring. Watch for construction in the area. The city will pursue Union Pacific to pay for the repairs.

Also, the derailment occurred just as construction

of the long-planned multi-use path next to the bluff on Greeley Avenue between Going Street and Interstate Avenue had started. That slowed the project until the damage assessment from the derailment was complete. The lane on Greeley next to the bluff will be closed during construction of the path. Please be careful in the construction zones. The path should be open next spring.

Adidas America will add a cycle track to the west side of Greeley from Willamette Boulevard to Going as part of their campus construction too. Once the projects north and south of Going are connected by a diagonal bicycle signal on Greeley over

Going, walking and cycling along Greeley should be much safer than before. Until then, pedestrians and bicyclists should avoid Greeley between adidas and Interstate by using Willamette from Greeley to Concord Avenue or Interstate.

Ask Addie

Good advice for good neighbors by Addie Humbert

I'm wondering why certain side streets and sidewalks are unpaved. Examples include Jessup & N Gay, N Holman & N Detroit. There are also prominent examples near NE Alberta. Is this due to neighbor or city decisions? -.A.M.

The city of Portland has more than 50 miles of unpaved city streets and another 200 miles of paved streets that lack a curb and sidewalks. In the Overlook Neighborhood, we have about a half mile of unpaved streets (that's about 1.5 percent of all our total roadways). How these streets escaped paving over all these years is a bit of a mystery, but it likely has something to do with the way Portland grew.

As land was annexed and became part of the city, developers (especially those closer to the city center) were required to pave roads where they wanted to build. Some streets clearly slipped through the cracks and those cracks haven't always filled, especially in traditionally underserved neighborhoods. Once a street had been paved, the City of Portland takes over its maintenance, but gravel roads have historically existed in a bit of a no man's land: no pavement meant no funds for upkeep. Although the unimproved roadways are part of the city's public right of way, the city has required that adjacent residents foot the bill.

The city has initiated several programs over the years to encourage neighbors to take ownership over the roads. If neighbors set up a Local Improvement District (LID), for example, the city will help with permitting and paving the roads, though the work must be up to city code and the neighbors are ultimately responsible for paying for the work. In some instances, neighbors have also been able to create small city "parklets" in place of the roadway if all the adjacent neighbors buy in.

As you might imagine, Portlanders have been asking the city to take on the costs of maintaining these roads for as long as they've existed. Plans have been promised and abandoned many times over. But in 2016, after myriad community requests and studies of how the deteriorating gravel roads impact on stormwater runoff, the City of Portland initiated a new system of maintenance.

The Gravel Street Service, from the Portland Bureau of Transportation, began last year. The service will fill in ruts and grade the road surface on a repeating three year cycle (though residents are still technically responsible for upkeep otherwise). North Portland gravel roads are slated to be completed in 2019 and 2020. If you want to go stomp around in the puddles or chance it with your car's suspension, now is the time

Portland? Do I have to fit them all in my green bin or will the city come and get them? -L.T.

What is the deal with leaf pickup in

The Portland Bureau of Transportation collects leaves as part of their Leaf Day Service. If you live in one of 52 leaf districts with a high concentration of mature trees (this is around one third of Portland homes), the city will remove leaves from the street on one or two designated days each fall. Historically there has been an extra fee associated with leaf pick up day, but starting in 2018 the city made the service free for all those who live in the designated districts.

Here in Overlook, neighbors living in the triangle south of Going Street and west of Interstate Avenue are in leaf district N 9 and their pick up day this year is December 18. The day before your scheduled pick up, rake all of your leaves onto the street in front of your house, being careful to leave a foot of space curbside for storm run off. Try to move your car and any other obstacles (tree limbs, basketball hoops) to make it easier for the trucks to access your street.

For the rest of us in Overlook? All leaves should go in your regular green bin. And no, they won't all fit but please don't rake them into the street. The leaves won't be picked up, it's against city code, and all you'll do is clog your storm drains.

Welcoming the Ivy School to the Neighborhood

Last February, the Portland Public Schools Board unanimously voted to revoke its sponsorship of Trillium Charter School after 17 years, due to declining enrollment and test scores. The school, located at 5420 N Interstate Ave. closed last spring. While many families were impacted by this closure, another charter school has purchased the property and has already opened its doors in its place.

Recongizable for its sculpted cob walls with little round peepholes, mosaics and a thatched roof, the school sits at the busy intersection of N Interstate and Killingsworth Avenue. The 21,000-square-foot building offers a large, paved fenced-in courtyard and bark chip play area and has allowed the school, which moved from NW Portland, to expand to offer a Montessori education for grades K-8.

The basic idea in the Montessori philosophy of education is that "all children carry unseen within themselves the person they will become. In order to develop their unique physical, emotional, intellectual and spiritual powers to the fullest, they must have freedom; a freedom achieved through order and self-discipline."

The Ivy School is a public charter sponsored by the Oregon Department of Education (not PPS), and is tuition-free. They are currently fully enrolled with 300 students, which is the maximum number that their charter allows. The charter is currently up for renewal, and they are hoping that with the renewal the maxiumum number of students increases so that they can welcome more students into their school in the coming years as they continue to expand in their new location.

Nikki Jones, the executive director of the school says that they are very happy to be in the Overlook Neighborhood, and have found friendly, helpful neighbors in all directions. They are excited to grow and serve the community. Tours for prospective families will be available starting in November, and you can visit their website: theivyschool.org to learn more and apply for the 2020 lottery.
