

Neighborhood Greenways: What? Where? And Why?



As we all stretch out and get back into the era of defining ‘post-covid’ lifestyle, it is important that we all know about and access one of Portland’s and Overlook’s most valuable and unique pieces of infrastructure: Neighborhood Greenways.

What are they? From the city website: Neighborhood greenways are low-traffic and low-speed streets where we give priority to people walking, bicycling, and rolling.

They are marked with signs, ‘sharrows’, speed bumps, and in some cases: traffic diverters to make sure all users are aware of who will be on these streets: people!

For Overlook residents, the closest Greenways are N Concord Ave, N Willamette Blvd, and N Michigan Ave (just on the other side of I-5). See insert.



Parking Permit Program Near adidas Ends – For Now

Remember how life was before the pandemic? Was it just a year ago in February that the temporary parking permit program started during the construction of the adidas Village expansion because construction workers and adidas employees were parking in the neighborhood? Does that seem like many, many moons ago? Well, the construction is almost over at the campus so that parking permit program which adidas paid for is too. For those of you that want to think back to those days, here is the link to the city’s webpage <https://www.portland.gov/transportation/parking/overlook-temporary-parking-permit-program>.

As of this March, the restricted parking sign poles were removed and the enforcement stopped. If not for the pandemic, the neighbors would have spent the winter deciding if they wanted to pay to retain the parking permit program

to have the ability to park on the street during the day. Instead, the lack of adidas employees at the Village at this time and the slow return will stretch the transition to many months instead of weeks. There should be plenty of parking for staff in the expanded parking structure. Some employees may choose to park in the neighborhood. When residents start struggling to find on-street parking near their homes during business hours, we may want to revisit having a parking permit program. Grant volunteered to chair the sustainability committee in order to get more involved in local issues facing our community, as well as help make our neighborhood a healthier environment for all (humans, plants and animals). As chair, he navigates the workings of federal, state and local government in dealing with environmental issues, gives Overlook a voice in ongoing public works projects, and organizes local plantings and cleanups.

Sidonia is an Oregon native, born and raised in Salem. She has been working in the public health sector since graduating with her bachelors in public health from OSU in 2017. After moving to Portland, she has taken up gardening in Portland Parks and Rec community gardens, and is part of a local Portland book club. She feels that joining the neighborhood association was natural next step and wanted to be a school liaison co-chair to bring a wider sense of community to our young residents, as well as help build relationships and support youth in the neighborhood.

Brian was born and raised in Portland. He moved to the Overlook neighborhood in 2017 and is currently a student pursuing a Masters in real estate development. He has always been fascinated with cities and how all the different facets interact to shape communities. By joining the land use committee, he hopes to meet more neighbors and help bring people together to strengthen our community.

Overlook Schools Back in Action

Have you noticed our neighborhood has been busier lately? That’s because schools are back for limited in-person learning! The coronavirus has shifted what everyday life has looked like for all of us over the past year and many of us have been living in a virtual environment. Some may have not even thought about school since the closures last March. We wanted to give residents a refresh of the schools in Overlook and give more insight into what our community looks like for youth in the neighborhood.

Overlook is home to Beach Elementary School and The Ivy School, a public Montessorri charter school serving kindergarten through eighth grade, as well as several preschools and daycares.

Beach Elementary, located at 1710 N Humboldt, is a dual-immersion school, meaning they offer an English and Spanish curriculum, as well as English only for students’ kindergarten through fifth grade. Entrance in the immersion program is based on lottery. The lottery for the 2021-22 school year is closed, and families should be notified early this month. The lottery typically opens the February before the new school year and closes in March. Portland Public School (PPS) offers Spanish immersion at six middle schools and four high schools.

Beach is enriched by different kinds of programs such as collaboration with SUN Community School, SEI (Self Enhancement, Inc.), SMART Program, and utilizes a restorative justice lens to create a deeper sense of community. These additional programs provide more opportunities for students to reach their full potential. Beach Elementary offers a variety of supports for those in attendance and their families. Currently on their website they have information on where COVID-19 vaccinations are available, support lines, and a breakdown of hybrid learning.

The Ivy School made Overlook its new home in September of 2019. Located in the former Trillium Charter School building at 5420 N Interstate, Ivy is a state-sponsored public Montessori charter school operating independently of the Portland Public School District. Ivy enrolls students from K-8. In addition to

their K-8 program, The Ivy School is also enrolling 3 & 4 year olds in their new Montessori Children’s House for the 2021/2022 school year. This is a separate program from the tuition-free K-8 program.

The Montessori method of education was developed by Italian physician Maria Montessori. Emphasizing independence, and views children as naturally eager for knowledge and capable of initiating learning. Students are embraced and taught to act with grace and courtesy, a major theme in everyday life for Ivy students.

Although students commute from many neighborhoods from all over Portland, there are some Ivy students that reside in the Overlook neighborhood. Enrollment into the Ivy School is by lottery starting in late January or after the lottery is held by post lottery & waitlist application. Keep an eye out for Summer 2022 summer camps! Due to covid limitations, these are cancelled for 2021.

This summer there are many more opportunities for kids in our community that weren’t available last year. We did the leg work for you! The following camps are open for the summer: Portland Parks and Rec summer camp and swimming lessons, YMCA overnight camps, Mad Science Camp (servicing Portland and Vancouver), Vibe of Portland (art, music and theatre camps) as well as OMSI (Oregon Museum of Science and Industry) camps. Make sure to check out their websites for registration. Due to high demand and limited capacities, these camps are filling up fast, make sure to register your child(ren) as soon as possible!

The Overlook Views and our weekly email update will continue to provide information on summer school, camps, and ways that all Overlook residents can support our local schools.



Movies in the Park–Cancelled

Chris Trejbal Bids Farewell to Overlook

Hello OKNA Board Members,

I have moved out of Overlook and no longer own a house there. Therefore, per our bylaws, I am no longer an eligible member of the Overlook Neighborhood Association nor may I serve on its board. I resign effective immediately.

It has been my tremendous honor to work with so many wonderful people who care passionately about Overlook, to serve our neighbors and to keep Overlook Portland's best neighborhood.

Soon after I moved to Overlook in 2013, I was surprised to find a copy of the Overlook Views on our doorstep. I enjoyed reading it, learning about my new neighborhood and discovering the clear love that neighbors had for their community. It made me realize we'd chosen well in where to live. I attended a couple of OKNA meetings that year.

The next summer, the OKNA communications coordinator announced she was stepping down. She put out a call in Views for someone to take over. I was interested, so at the Summer Social I spoke with her and some board members. They convinced me to take on the job, but I had one condition: I wouldn't serve on the board.

That didn't last. I still remember the meeting a few months later when the board appointed me to a seat. Board members thought that whoever was responsible for the weekly neighborhood email update needed to be on the board so that person could reflect the organizational voice.

I didn't mind much. I'd made friends on the board, I'd been attending meetings anyway, and I cared about the neighborhood. Under OKNA Chair Danielle Herman's leadership, we started to reach out to more people in the neighborhood and to have more of a voice at the city.

When Danielle resigned a couple of years later, it was with some hesitancy that I volunteered to become chair. No one else seemed to want to do it. I served in that role for three years, the maximum allowed in our bylaws, and I like to think we made a lot of difference in the neighborhood and Portland. We took on some high-profile issues like the illegal homeless camps at Hazelnut Grove and elsewhere in the neighborhood and state transportation plans that could dump massive traffic volume into the neighborhood. But I prefer to remember the smaller things we did to make Overlook a great place to live.

We joined Friends of Overlook Bluff to save the Overlook Terrace Oak. We made sure that an affordable housing development on Interstate Avenue would include active uses to make that important corridor more vibrant and serve residents. We organized annual movies in the park. We raised money for Patton Square Park. We held neighborhood cleanup events at which we picked up trash and made new friends. We improved relations with adidas. And so much more.

Most important, we were there when neighbors had a concern about this or that and didn’t know what to do about it. We didn’t always have the answer they wanted to hear, but we gave them the tools and knowledge to pursue their goals. If we didn’t have an answer, we made the calls and did the research to find one.

Over the years, I learned a lot from great board members with whom I had the privilege to serve. Alan Cranna, Cynthia Sulaski, Brad Halverson, George Spaulding and Kent Hoddick each had such depth of knowledge about Overlook’s history. Their commitment to making Overlook great, year after year on the board, was inspiring. They taught me that the long game is what’s important. Travails come and go, but Overlook perseveres and remains a wonderful place to live because of the people who choose to call it home, not because of anything the city does or doesn’t do. Cynthia in particular never ceased to amaze me with her boundless energy advocating for parks. And Alan was always a useful sounding board a couple of doors down from our house.

Other board members had other lessons. Michael Shea helped me better understand city land-use rules and how to navigate the bureaucracy. Addie Humbert and Kristina Kern reminded me that

sometimes it’s important to trust someone to try something new. More often than not, they’ll deliver. Casey Boggs helped me understand that even when you’re fired up about something, moderation is usually the better course. And Mitch Bixby always kept me honest.

There were many other special people over the years, too many to name individually.

Finally, I want to thank Alexandra Degher who stepped up as chair after my term. She has been wonderful to work with and showed me that there are different routes to the same end. She is a far better mediator than I, and I have learned a lot watching her in action. I leave confident that Overlook is in good hands.

In any community, there will be disagreements. I know that some of the decisions the board and I made over the years had detractors – and I heard from those detractors often. But I know those decisions had supporters, too. My goal never was to strike artificial balance or try to accomplish the impossible and make everyone happy. Rather, I sought to do right, be ethical, give everyone a voice and ultimately make the tough decisions and then fight for them. If people didn’t agree, they could replace me at the next election. They never did.

Thank you, board members and neighbors, for being a precious part of my life for the past seven years. I will miss Overlook and wish you all the best in the future.
